WARTIME HINTS
for a lady who wants to

SAVE
electricity and appliances!

SAVING ELECTRICITY A cardinal rule today is that "Use as much electricity as you need, but don't waste it." There are many practical ways of saving electricity in your home—using the right kind of appliances, lighting, the use of your cooking, heating, and other appliances. Don't use too many of them. Don't use them too long. Don't use them too often. Don't use them too carelessly. Don't use them too wastefully. Don't use them too recklessly. Don't use them too carelessly. SMALL APPLIANCES Don't jerk cord from socket when finished using. Disconnect by grasping plug. Don't clean wires with fork. Use sharp tool. Never dip appliance in water. Let appliance cool before storing away. Always clean grids on waffle iron after using. Don't let electric iron overheat.

YOUR HOME LIGHTING Dust sticks light-robbing you of as much as one-fourth the light you pay for. This is pure waste. Keep your lamps clean. Clean glass and reflector bowls frequently. Don't shade inside and out. Use the right-size bulbs in your lamps and fixtures, and select shades with a white lining.

ELECTRIC COOKING Use the built-in electric range. Plan complete meals that can be cooked in the oven at one time. Finish surface cooking on "low" or stored heat when possible. Use flat-bottomed utensils to avoid warping. Cook with little water, and cover steaks with a tight lid.

YOUR REFRIGERATOR Don't overcrowd your refrigerator. Unless the motor is basically cooled, it will not operate properly. Inspect regularly. Be sure there is adequate air circulation around the refrigerator. Defrost regularly. (Never use a knife or sharp tool for defrosting). Clean inside of refrigerator with lukewarm water and mild soap.

YOUR ELECTRIC WASHER Drain washer and rinse tub thoroughly after each washing. Remove agitator and clean. Wipe dry with a soft cloth. Don't force thick, bulky objects through your wringer—use hard objects like belt buckles, etc. Release pressure on rolls when not in use, and dry wringer thoroughly. Don't overload your washer.

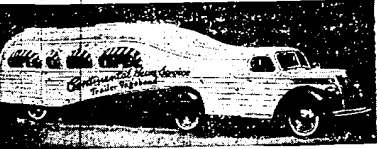

Proposed Amendments
(Proposal No. 1)
Revision of the Constitution of the State of Michigan.
No. 1. Article XVII, Sec. 4, of the Constitution, provides that in 1926 and each sixth year thereafter, the question of a general revision of the Constitution shall be submitted to the electors. If a majority of the electors voting thereon vote in favor of revision, a constitutional convention will be called to draft and propose to the electors a general revision of the Constitution.
(Proposal No. 2)
Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Permitting Wayne County to Adopt a Charter.
No. 2. Sufficient petitory petitions have been filed requiring submission to the electors of an amendment to the Constitution to stand as Section 15b, of Article VIII, permitting Wayne County to adopt a charter.
(Proposal No. 3)
Referendum on Act 369, Public Acts of Michigan of 1941, Commonly Known as the Milk Marketing Act.
No. 3. The question submitted to the electors is the approval of Act 369, Public Acts of 1941, commonly known as the Milk Marketing Act, creating a Milk Marketing Board, defining its powers and duties, authorizing the board to levy assessments of its producers and dealers for administrative expenses and to provide penalties for violations of provisions of said Act and declare its effect, under Article V, Section 1, of the Constitution.
The polls of said election will be open at 7:00 o'clock a.m. and will remain open until 8:00 o'clock p.m. of said day of Election.

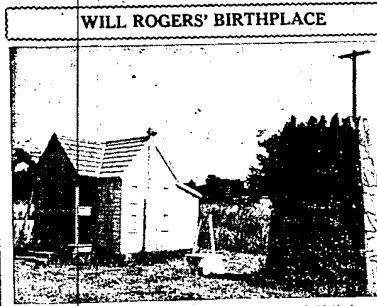

Fifteen miles, as the road goes over the hills from Claremore, is the little town of Oologah, Okla., a monument in honor of their most famous citizen. A picture of the humorist is set in the stone near the top. In all my wanderings through the cemeteries of the country, I have seen but one other monument that showed a picture of the deceased. That was in a cemetery in Sioux City, Iowa, when I was checking on a story of a Swedish plot where all deceased were buried standing up. Some one has told me that setting a picture into a monument is an old Swedish custom. That may or may not be authentic—I don't know. But whatever the origin, the custom should be revived. The smiling picture of Will Rogers, set in the monument here at Oologah, makes a visitor smile in return.

History has given us many great men that fought their way up the ladder of success from a poor beginning. Rogers was an outstanding example. From a cowboy to the best loved person of his generation is a far step. Yet through it all he remained the same unassuming person that rode from an Oklahoma ranch to conquer the world. Even at the time of his death, he had not changed. In one showplace in the Memorial at Claremore are the various articles that were in his pockets at the time of the crash. Among them are a few three cent stamps, a set jack-knife, and two watches. Retail price—one dollar each.
