A VIEW OF BATTERED COLOGNE



COLOGNE, GERMANY—This air view of the important German industrial city of Cologne, scene of the first RAF 1,000-plane attack in the war, was made from RAF reconnaissance planes. It shows the debris still being cleared away and barges being used to clear away rubble from the gutted dockyard area—and the raid was four months ago. Last week the city had some more debris to dig out from under. A "strong force" of bombing planes, estimated at about 400, planes did the new demolition job.

WRITE LETTERS TO BUILD MORALE STATES COLONEL

"Letters from home are the biggest morale builders that civilians can contribute to the armed forces," states Col. George T. Shank, commanding officer of Fort Custer, "but we are not permitted to give civilians the names of soldiers to whom they might write."

Numbers of letters are received each week at Post Headquarters asking the names of soldiers who don't receive any mail or who are lonesome. Each one is answered with the statement that the War Department prohibits officers from initiating correspondence between soldiers and civilians whom they do not know.

To protect both the soldiers and civilians from persons who might misrepresent themselves, the War Department ruling was necessary. The Public Relations Office, which answers all such requests, recommends to persons desiring to correspond with soldiers that they concentrate on their friends and acquaintances in the game community, as no soldier can have too much mail.

Colds will be scarcer at Fort Custer than in civilian communities this winter if the two pages of instructions issued here by Col. George T. Shank, commanding officer of the fort, are followed. Preventive health measures are featured in the Army health program.

Intensification of all preventive measures tending to reduce respiratory diseases was ordered by the Colonel. Palnastaking and frequent inspections have been ordered as unit surgeons have been instructed to carefully observe any causative conditions which might be corrected.

Instructions to the men include: Avoid contact with known sufferers; Abandon the practice of passing cigarette butts.

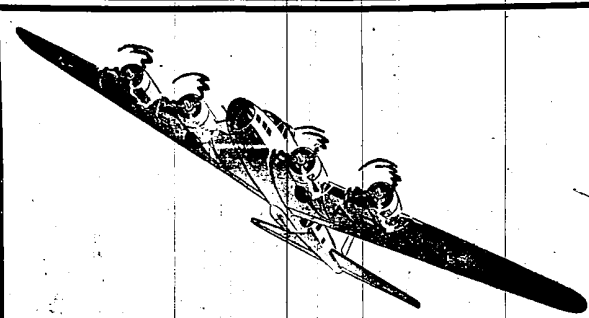
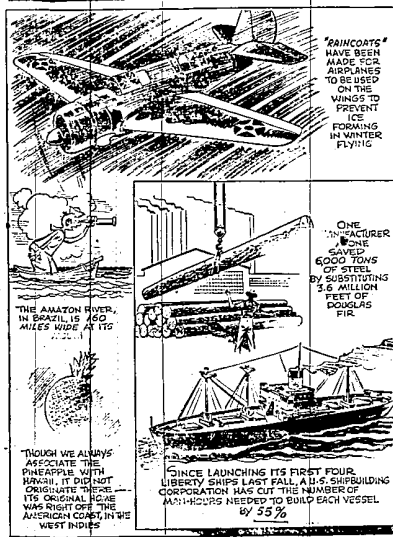
Edgewood Rebekahs To Entertain District
