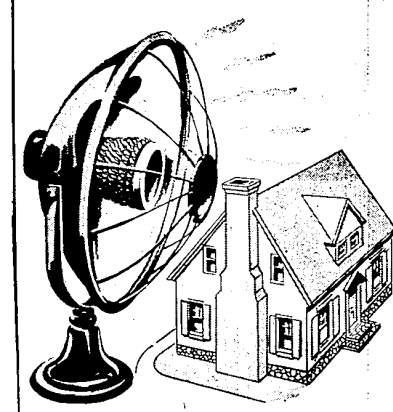

Is ELECTRIC HEAT



practical for your whole house?

A small bathroom heater does a good job for short periods of time—an hour or two. It's fine if used in a small space. Why isn't the idea practical for heating a whole house? Or why can't electric heat be used throughout the house as a means of raising the temperature from 65 to 70 degrees?

There are two reasons. First, to achieve the cleanliness and convenience of electric heat, you sacrifice 80 per cent of the coal used to make electricity. Only ONE TON OUT OF FIVE is actually delivered to your home; in the form of useful heat. This represents a loss—especially when you can burn coal in your own furnace at 60 per cent efficiency. Even using electric heat to raise your house temperature 5 degrees is not recommended today.

Second, electricity must be made the instant it is being used and on cold days each house would require about 80 times as much as it uses normally. The extra power plant equipment to produce enough electricity to heat houses on a cold day would be partly idle on a warmer day; and it would be completely idle all summer. But the expense would continue the year round, and to cover this all-year expense, the cost of electricity would be high.

All the above pertains to house heating. Electricity is, of course, highly economical for standard uses like water heating, cooking or other uses of refined heat requiring closer control.

NAVY OPENS ENLISTMENT CAMPAIGN

Enlistment of at least 4,000 Michigan men in the Navy is the goal of a campaign which opens here and throughout the state next Saturday, November 7, and lasts until December 7, the first anniversary of the Jap attack on Pearl Harbor.

This was announced today by Lieut. Byron E. Flechtner, Officer in Charge of Navy recruiting in Michigan. The 4,000 goal has been set as enough men to provide crews for a battleship, cruiser, destroyer, submarine, sub-chaser and patrol torpedo boat.

"Navy enlistments in Michigan," said Lieutenant Flechtner, "have been at a higher level in recent months than at any time in history. However, the production of warships also has attained a record peak."

"Thus, it becomes apparent that Navy enlistments must not diminish, but actually must increase in volume so that we may be assured of providing enough men to operate these new ships and assure defeat of the Axis."

"I hope that all Michigan men from 17 to 50 years old, inclusive, who have not yet looked into what the Navy has to offer, will do so during the period from November 7 to December 7."

"Let's give the Japs an answer to their stab in the back last December 7."

Auxiliary Women Sponsor Card Party

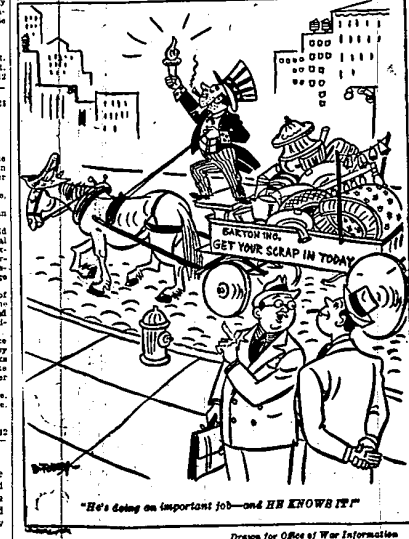
