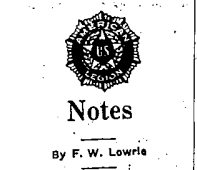


American Legion

When Buying Pliers

Make Use of Fats

Before selling fats, homemakers should use them in every way possible. Then they should pour surplus fat into clean, wide-mouthed cans, such as coffee, lard, or tomato cans. Strain the fat, remove meat and other food particles. Keep the fat in refrigerator or some other dark cool place until you have a pound or more. Then use what you have to your best dealer or frozen food locker plant, where you will be paid a few cents a pound for what you have to offer. Don't take the fat to the dealer in a glass container.

FAMOUS FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT WILL LECTURE

Walter Duranty, famous foreign correspondent for the New York Times and the North American Newspaper Alliance will speak at Detroit Town Hall in the Fisher Theatre, Wednesday morning, November 11.

After four years of constant traveling through Europe and Asia, Duranty has returned for his first lecture tour with dramatic eye-witness reports of what is really happening in Eastern Europe and the Orient.

This brilliant journalist, who covered World War I as well as most of the important events in Eastern Europe during the past twenty years, won the Pulitzer Prize for Foreign Correspondence, and later the O. Henry Short Story Award. He has been in Roumania and Bulgaria when those countries capitulated to the Nazis. During the past few years since he last visited this country, he has been in virtually every capital in Europe, in and out of Russia repeatedly, and in the Orient. In his lecture, "When East Meets West in Battle," Duranty will discuss the latest developments in the war gleaned from his own extensive experiences among the Soviets and Japanese.

Lauriaty is the author of "I Write as I Please," "One Life, One Kopeck," "The Kremlin and the People," and writes for many of the leading magazines.
