RED CROSS NOTES

Replying to numerous inquiries regarding the annual membership campaign, Byron B. Webb, chairman of the Oakland county chapter of the American Red Cross, today stated that the drive has been changed from fall to spring.

He added that the national 1918 American Red Cross War Fund Drive is scheduled to be held in March, which has been designated Red Cross month by President Roosevelt.

R. W. Esig of Birmingham will again direct the Roll Call campaign in Oakland County. The local chapter will be represented at a national meeting in Chicago, December 2, when preliminary arrangements for the drive will be discussed. Walter S. Gifford is chairman of the national campaign.

INTERESTING BITS
OF NEWS FROM
FORT CUSTER

--5 tons of it--and all the fixin's will wait upon the appetites of the thousands of soldiers here on Thanksgiving Day as the Army follows its time-honored custom of supplying a royal feast on the distinctly American holiday.

Thanksgiving Dinner in the Army is always served at noon. Not only does the soldier's biggest meal invariably come at that time, but always before, according to custom, the men get the afternoon off. This year, however, the Secretary of War has decreed Thanksgiving Day a full working day for the Army.

In addition to the five tons of turkey, soldiers here will consume a fruit cocktail of 700 Honeydew melons and 100 No. 10 cans of pineapple. Cranberry sauce will be made from 500 pounds of berries, while the tomato salad will have 600 pounds of lettuce and 1200 pounds of tomatoes. Five hundred stalks of stuffed celery and 50 gallons of mixed pickles will be the meal's relishes.

Two tons of mashed potatoes will be covered with hundreds of gallons of gravy. On the same plates will be 300 cans (No. 10 size) of peas and 1500 cans of No. 2 size of cream corn. Nearly a ton of bread will be buttered with 200 pounds of butter for this one meal.

Fies will use 1500 cans of pumpkin, and they will be eaten with 1000 gallons of coffee. To round out the meal will be served 7500 eating apples, three quarters of a ton of grapes, a ton of assorted hard candies, and a ton of mixed nuts.

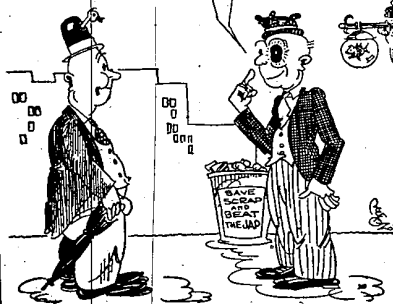
Custer soldiers will eat the same meal that soldiers in every post in the Sixth Service Command will eat under the central planning of the War Department. Like many other Americans, they will sup on turkey soup, sandwiches of cold cuts and cheese, potato salad, chocolate sundaes and tea.

Participation in the National Service Life Insurance program is being urged for all officers and enlisted men at Fort Custer immediately instead of delaying making their insurance applications until they reach staging areas, preparatory to going overseas and thus placing an avoidable burden on organization commanders and the medical officers at the last minute.

Insurance is available in amounts ranging from one to ten thousand dollars. Monthly premiums on a \$10,000 policy run from \$6.40 for an 18-year-old policy holder to \$8.50 for a 40-year-old policy holder. The insurance program, authorized by Congress, is administered by the Veterans Administration.

Regulation uniforms of light blue will be worn by the four Army hostesses and the two librarians on duty in the Service Clubs here as soon as they are available for purchase. It was learned here this week from the War Department.
