



Registration To Be Held At City Hall

Regular Hours Will Be Observed

More than 25,000 Michigan youths will be registered in the sixth general Selective Service registration to be conducted by local boards during the period beginning next Friday, December 11, and continuing through December 31.

Those who were born on or after July 1, 1924, but not after August 31, 1925, shall be registered on any day during the week commencing December 11, 1942, and ending December 17, 1942.

Those who were born on or after September 1, 1924, but not after October 31, 1925, shall be registered on any day during the week commencing December 18, and ending December 24.

Those who were born on or after November 1, 1924, but not after December 31, 1925, shall be registered on any day during the period commencing December 25, and ending December 31.

During the continuance of the war those born on or after January 1, 1926, shall be registered on the day they attain their 18th birthday anniversary.

More than 2,800,000 men have already been registered by the Michigan Selective Service System, Colonel Rosecrance indicated, in one of the most complete inventories of manpower ever accomplished. This includes all men in Michigan between the ages of 18 and 65. All men between the ages of 18 and 65 who are in the military service, if not otherwise deferred by their local boards. It is expected that the bulk of the manpower calls for the Armed Forces from Michigan will be made from registrants in the "best" group during the next few months.
