FAMED NEW YORK CORRESPONDENT IS NEXT SPEAKER

Hallett Abend, Chief Correspondent for the New York Times in the Far East will speak at Detroit Town Hall, in the Fisher Theatre, Wednesday morning, January 27.

For the past fifteen years, Abend's timely reports from the Orient have been making headline copy in American newspapers. His books, "Japan Unmasked," "Chaos in India" are standard references; such scoops as his advance story of Japan's joining the Axis have made political as well as journalistic history.

This distinguished correspondent first went to the Far East in 1926 on a six month round trip ticket as a vacation from scenario writing. He stayed on to write special dispatches for the North American Newspaper Alliance, covering guerrilla warfare, bombing, sieges, one civil war after the other, and meeting key figures in the present conflict. His lecture subject is: "What Can We Do to Japan?"

Abend, 47, is a native Indiana-born and is one of the few of the total population—are not British subjects, but live in the Indian States which cover nearly two-thirds of the area of India and are not British territory.

Perfect Moment
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- 2 Avoid letting hot water run while washing hands, dishes or shaving.
- 3 Insulate hot water tanks and pipes to avoid waste.
- 4 Turn off non-automatic water heater when enough water is heated.
- 5 Drain about a gallon of water from bottom of tank once a month to remove sediment.
- 6 Check thermostat setting on automatic water heater. 120° to 150° should be sufficient for normal use.
- 7 Keep coils clean in coil type water heater.

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
