Volunteers Will Begin New Study For ACS

Some 233 volunteers will begin a search this month for 12,000 Wayne County citizens who filled out questionnaires for the American Cancer Society 12 years ago.

Why the search and new ingathering of information?

"Time goes on, things change," according to Mrs. Norman H. Robbins of Southfield. "Just think of filter cigarettes, what is their influence on the lung cancer menace?"

"BUT THAT'S only part of the reason. The first part of the study showed up deaths from lung cancer and a few of the other most common cancers, but an insufficient number for cancer of each of the many less common ones. Now we'll have sufficient numbers to see if there is any relationship between varied environmental factors and cancer."

"Actually, these invaluable volunteers are re-opening the society's massive cancer prevention study," explains Mrs. Robbins. "That study began in 1959 and was continued for six years. Approximately one million Americans were questioned about their health and living habits."

"Over 13,000 citizens of Wayne County participated. Now we must see how many are alive today and how many died of cancer."

QUESTIONS DEALT with factors previously associated with cancer, diet, environmental conditions, previous disease, habits, heredity and family contacts.

"Tremendous amounts of information have come out of the data assembled thus far," explains Mrs. Robbins. "Just to give a few examples, much of what we know about the dangers of cigaret smoking came from the study. 'We've learned that urban air pollution has very little if any influence on death rates from lung cancer. On the other hand, occupational exposure to certain types of dusts or vapors does increase the risk of lung cancer.'"

The study demonstrated the great importance of abnormal bleeding as a warning signal for cancer of the uterus. It is especially important for women with this complaint to have a medical examination and a Pap test at least once a year.

"This is part of what we mean by cancer prevention," Mrs. Robbins says. "We know that if we can detect this form of cancer early we can save these women."

She adds, "For many years there was a debate as to whether tuberculosis increased or decreased the risk of lung cancer. Our data showed that the risk of lung cancer is almost exactly the same for people with a history of tuberculosis as for people who have never had the disease."

Kroger Will Test Nutritional Labels

Nutritional labeling of food products will be tested by Kroger for a three-month period starting early in 1972, in cooperation with the Food and Drug Administration of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

N.A. Sawall, vice president of the Detroit division of Kroger Food Stores, said the three-month test will cover five food products distributed thru 69 Kroger Food Stores in the greater Cincinnati area.

The products which will carry nutritional information on their labels during the test are Kroger Mel-Soft white bread, Kroger homogenized Vitamin D milk, Kroger Grade A Large eggs, Kroger pork and beans and Kroger peanut butter.

Although the Detroit division area is not a part of the official test with FDA, Sawall said Kroger eggs and possibly other items, which are distributed by Kroger in this area, will carry the same nutritional information as the test stores.

Each label will carry a listing of major nutrients in the product and will indicate their importance as measured against the recommended dietary allowances for adults, as established by the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Academy of Sciences.

Purpose of the test is to assist the FDA in determining the type of nutritional labeling which will be most helpful to consumers in planning family meals. Dr. Ogden Johnson, director of the Division of Nutrition for FDA, will be responsible for analyzing the results.
