High School Youth Enter New Program

Seventeen Year Olds To Enter Training

Opportunity is now granted for a limited number of high school and college students who are seventeen years of age, to win their Navy Wings of Gold, and their commissions in the United States Naval Reserve or the Marine Corps Reserve.

Qualified applicants may enlist as apprentice seamen, U.S. 1, it is assumed that applicants will be high school graduates or high school seniors who may reasonably be expected to be graduated by June 30, 1943.

Following the required training period, successful aviation cadets will be commissioned Ensigns in the United States Naval Reserve or Second Lieutenants in the United States Marine Corps Reserve with the full pay and allowances of those ranks.

Apprentice seamen, U.S. 1, enrolled in accredited high schools or secondary schools who drop out of school for any reason at all to be graduated by the end of the academic year current at the time of enlistment will be immediately transferred to Class V.6 and ordered to active duty in the Naval Service.

General requirements for appointment are as follows: Applicant must: (a) Be a male citizen of the United States for a period of at least ten years.
