Slice Your Own And Like It!

Housewives who harbor unkindly thoughts of Uncle Sam as they slice the bread for breakfast toast or dinner, recalling the days when their bread came nicely sliced in double-waxed wrapping paper, will gladly submit to the inconvenience of slicing their own bread when they understand the reasons behind the no-slicing provision of the order recently issued by Food Administrator Wickard.

At the present time, our fighting forces need 52 tons of wax every month for treating shoes and leather to make them gas proof; the army ordinance requires 822 tons every 30 days to coat exportable equipment and ammunition (cars, trucks, tanks, and other vehicles) with wax instead of in tin, which is scarce).

It takes 1 1/2 pounds of wax to coat 21 pounds of paper used to wrap sliced bread. Wrapping paper for unsliced bread requires only ten pounds of wax for the same amount of paper. Many bakers also use an inner wrap of wax paper for sliced bread. This is eliminated entirely under the new bread order.

EXPENSES OF FARMERS ARE DEDUCTIBLE

A farmer who operates a farm for profit is entitled to deduct from gross income as necessary expenses all amounts expended, other than those constituting capital expenditures in the carrying on of the business of farming. The cost of feeding and raising live stock may be treated as an expense deduction actually as such costs are included in the value of farm produce grown upon the farm or the labor of the taxpayer.

General Motors Contribution Is Received

Farmington is expected to go "over the top" in meeting its goal of \$5,243 in the American Red Cross War Fund Drive during March, according to co-chairman Mrs. W. W. Slocum and Mrs. Joseph DeVrilt.

The quota for Oakland County has been set at \$178,000. The General Motors Contribution to the Oakland County War Drive was received Wednesday and totaled \$2,000, of which amount \$2,000 came from the Yellow Truck and Coach and \$30,000 from Fisher Body and Pontiac Motor. In apportioning this donation, Farmington received an allocation of \$1,695. Novi received \$798, and Southfield received \$1,320. These allocated sums will apply on the quota set.

The Farmington Post Office, for the third consecutive year enrolled 100 per cent, as have the girls of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company office in Farmington, employees of the Farmington State Bank and the Roy Plunton barber shop.

The sight of the flag is inspiring in itself, let alone the thought and work of the Red Cross organization and its workers.
