Early in the third quarter Coach Hutton hit on the right combination, and his players ran up a total of nine points to Wallied Lake's none. Wallied Lake tied up at 20-20 in the dying seconds of the fourth quarter. At the end of official time Captains Pauline and Richardson were ejected from the game for unmentionable conduct with a host of substitutes. In the first overtime Wallied Lake threatened several times, but their shots went wild. In the last overtime period, still at 20-20, Wallied Lake took the lead on a 21-point shot. But Bacon and Tyler, each made baskets to clinch the victory. Tyler's basket was a beautiful backward-over-the-head shot from a very difficult angle.

Former second team members called on for the game were Tyndal, Dunkel, Aschenbrenner and Bacon. On regulars were present: see action were Pauline, Hamlin, Doll, Maloney and Walbank. Eleven baskets and two out of six free throws accounted for F.H.S. 24 points, while W.L. threatened Farmington's defense for only 5 baskets, but nine out of thirteen free throws were made to account for her 21 points.

This Friday night a hot contest is in store at Farmington. The rubber game between Redford Union and Farmington is to be played. Redford Union won the first meeting 19-17, but Farmington turned the tables 30-23 in the last meeting.

For Election to Be Held April 5, 1943
