We Loan Our Money

The Second War Loan Drive is on right now. It is a drive to raise through the sale of War Bonds the sum of \$13,000,000,000. Michigan's share of this amount is \$362,500,000.

That sounds like a lot of money ... but it costs a lot of money to wage a war, and all of us must contribute toward meeting this cost by loaning our money to the Government. We are not asked to give it to the Government, only to loan it, and our principal will be repaid to us with interest.

If we should lose the war ... and there isn't any guarantee that we can't lose it ... our money would be worthless. The enemy would take over the country and everything that we have away from us. By everything we do not alone mean our worldly possessions, but our very lives and liberties.

We know you want America to win this war. And yet... what are you doing to bring Victory sooner? If Japanese bombing planes were swooping over your home... if Nazi guns were blasting at your city or town, would you hesitate to put everything that you own into the fight against the invader?
