which the boys enjoyed immensely. The new Pack setup at John Grace School is well under way and Mrs. Swarthout has more Den Mothers lined up to help her.

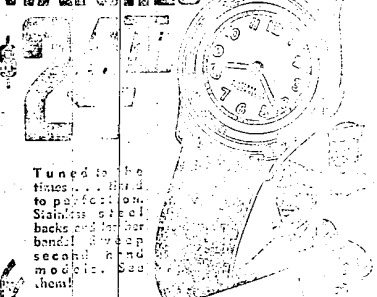
