Churches Plan Easter Services

Evangelical Church Will Burn Mortgage

Easter this year will be a day of particular joy and thanksgiving to friends and members of the Salem Evangelical and Reformed Church.

At eight o'clock in the evening a service will be held at which the mortgage, valued at \$1200, will be burned. This program of improvement, undertaken in the fall of 1940, acquired a cost of \$15,000, parts of which were paid by individuals. However, an indebtedness of \$1200 remained, and to this amount \$1200 was added in the erection of a garage and cement work on the Church property.

Now, through the faith and co-operation of members and friends of Salem Church, it is possible to have a church free of debt.

A dinner will be served at the church at 4:30 o'clock Easter Day, and a special service will be held at 8:00 that evening. A hearty invitation is extended to all to be present on this happy occasion.

At the morning worship service on Easter there will be special music prepared by Mrs. Ruth Hammond, music director at the Church. In addition to the choir anthems, three trumplers, Kenneth McLaughlin, Louie Horvath and Ray Grover, will participate, and there will be two guest soloists, Leatrice Lynn, soprano, and V. Buttrick, alto.

Members will be accepted in the Church at this service, and Holy Communion will follow immediately after the regular worship. The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Hamrick, Kathleen Susan, will be presented for Holy Baptism.

Baptist Church
In place of the regular evening preaching hour at the First Baptist Church, the choir, under the direction of the pastor, the Rev. Fred E. Fisher, will present an Easter cantata on Easter Sunday evening, entitled "The Glorious Galleon." The hour of service for this occasion has been moved from 7:30 to 8:00 p.m.

In order to make it more fair for everyone, Mr. Ross has had to limit his customers to one dozen cookies per person, and hereafter Wednesday there will be no cookies, though there will still be lots of rolls, fried cakes, pies, layer cakes, cup cakes and other delicacies for which Mr. Ross is so well known.

ANNUAL CLEAN-UP IN THE TOWNSHIP STARTS NEXT WEEK

The annual clean-up in Farmington Township, under the direction of John Cox, will begin next week Wednesday, April 23. Mr. Cox was awarded the contract by the Township Board at their meeting Tuesday evening.

Beginning the 28th, to May 1st, collections will be made in the subdivisions East of Orchard Lake Road and North of Grand River. From May 1st through May 4th, collections will be made West of Orchard Lake Road and North of Grand River and May 4th through May 8th, collections will be made from Grand River south through to Eight Mile Road.

Notices will be posted throughout the Township, advising residents of the collection. Junk and rubbish to be picked up should be placed at the side of the road so the truck may easily pick it up, and should be in metal or wooden containers.
