Payroll Savings Buys Comfort For Your Fighting Relatives

Not all of your payroll savings plan is used for tanks, planes and gunpowder. A part of your investment goes for the comfort of your father, brother, son or friend.

Put your war bond buying through your payroll savings plan on a family basis to do the most effective job in providing for the care and safety of your men in the armed forces. Figure it out for yourself how much beyond 10 per cent of the aggregate income of your family you can put into war bonds above the cost of the necessities of life.

Remember a single \$18.75 war bond will buy for a fighting soldier on the front. Two cotton undershirts at 44 cents; two pairs of cotton shorts at 75 cents; two pairs of cotton socks at 34 cents; one pair of shoes at \$3.21; a cotton bed shirt at \$4.64; pair twill trousers at \$4.16; one web waist belt at 23 cents; two cotton neckties at 44 cents; 2 khaki caps at \$1.26 and one twill jacket at \$2.16. Total \$19.74.

An \$18.75 war bond should make a marine comfortable for the night with a 25-pod mattress at \$4.99; two blankets at \$13.54; a pillow at 56 cents and two pillow covers at 30 cents. Total \$18.00.

Or he could be provided with a rubber poncho at \$4.77; a helmet with its lining and other items of his assembly at \$5.62; a rifle cartridge belt at \$2.15; a marine corps pack consisting of haversack, knapsack and suspenders at \$5.10; a canteen and its cover at \$1.65. Total \$18.00.

Those of you who worry about the comfort of your boy in service can help insure his comfort by buying war bonds. And 10 years from now you'll take back \$25 for every \$18.75 you put in.

Railroads Increase Traffic, But Accident Toll Drops
Railroads performed 34 per cent more freight service and 82 per cent more passenger service, as measured by ton-miles and passenger-miles in 1912 than in the preceding year. This greatly expanded service was performed with an increase of only 3.2 per cent in the number of fatalities to persons and rise of only 27.1 per cent in the number of non-fatal injuries.

The 1912 accident record should be compared with years of similar traffic and operating conditions in order properly to measure the degree of progress in safety work. The year 1929 offers one good basis of comparison, because that year represented the peak traffic year prior to the current war period. In the year 1918 is another good year for comparison with 1912 because it was a year of wartime operations, involving heavy troop and war commodity movements. Both 1929 and 1918 fall considerably short of 1912 in respect of both freight and passenger traffic volume. However, the pressure of capacity operations was somewhat similar in all three years.

Comparing 1912 with 1929, ton-miles increased 42 per cent; passenger-miles increased 72 per cent; fatalities decreased 20 per cent; non-fatal injuries decreased 30 per cent.

The 1912 accident record is even more striking when compared with 1918. Ton-miles increased 57 per cent; passenger-miles increased 21 per cent; fatalities decreased 42 per cent.

Milkmaid Gives Clue for Vaccine Against Smallpox
During a smallpox epidemic of the late 1700s, when most people stayed indoors, Gloucestershire Physician, Ophthalmologist and Post Edward Jenner one day met a little milkmaid walking about the nearly deserted streets and cautioned her to go home quickly for fear of infection. She gazed only long enough to say: "Oh, I can't get it. I've had cowpox." The words aroused Dr. Jenner's interest and launched him on an inquiry which lasted several years and finally long enough to say: "I have discovered that the milkmaid he visited farms and spoke to dairy hands. Invariably they repeated the girl's assertion: 'Those who had had cowpox were free of fever.'"

In 1786 Jenner was prepared to put his rural belief and his theory to a test. From the hands of a dairymaid he obtained cowpox virus, scratched it into the skin of eight-year-old James Phipps. Phipps soon sicken slightly and then recover. Nineteen days later young Phipps was inoculated with smallpox virus, barely reacted.

Almost seven years elapsed before Dr. Jenner's discovery was accepted. During that time he campaigned alone, inoculated gratis as many as 300 poor Londoners a day. Finally, in 1800 the world conceded that vaccination meant immunity, and for the next 140 years it worked on the extermination of smallpox; now a textbook disease to most medical students.
