July 4, 1943

You probably won't remember me by just reading my name, but the fellow who used to work at Pauline's Market, I graduated from Farmington High School last year. Although I have always lived in Livonia Center, I spent most of my time in Farmington and have made most of my very dear and close friends there. I am now in the U.S. Navy serving overseas duty, and let me tell you I sure do appreciate your sending me the Farmington Enterprise. It's hard to tell you just how much it really means to me. I can pretty well keep track of many of my boy friends, who are also in the service by reading the service notes. Your "Around the Block" column is most interesting and enjoyable to me; after I read that I feel as if I have really been home for a while, and boy is that a wonderful feeling.

I believe my sweetheart, Miss Carol Beach, gave my name to you and asked you to send me the paper. Incidentally, Carol and I became engaged while I was home in leave in December. That's another very important reason I want to get back to Farmington soon.

We have quite a few planes here and the work is really interesting. I made my petty officers ratings at Navy Pier and while there I had the pleasure of having a hot date, boy in the company next to me—Jim Youngblood, although he wasn't there very long before I left.

This is more like a vacation compared to Navy Pier and the climate is really swell. It gets plenty cold here at night. We have mountains all around us and the sea breezes are really swell. Would you please transfer the Enterprise to my new base as I would appreciate it very much. It's good to read about the old home town and to read about the boys in the various services and what they are doing.

I will close now and again, thanks for the Enterprise.

The following letter was received by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hunt, after their son, Carl, and the writer, Jim Schulkins, had met "some" where in the Southwest Pacific.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Hunt:
I am not allowed to say where I am or give any descriptive information. However I can tell you a few facts. We live in tents; do our own washing; have no electricity; but in all we have a pretty good time.

For amusement we have shows every other night. For our daily amusement we have various details. I worked with a group on a detail which consisted of carrying rocks, shoveling dirt, and proper use of a pickaxe. This detail lasted a week and I sure was glad when it was over.

I should like to tell you about a very interesting experience I had today. I was at a place where I had shipped a cup of coffee and bought a loaf of bread. I stood outside gazing around at the fellows and chawing away at the bread when I glanced about ten feet directly in front of me and there stood Carl Hunt. It seemed like a dream and I could hardly believe my eyes. I said "Hunt" and he looked at me. We had a nice chat and talk about you folks at home and the boys in the service. I was happier than words can say. Carl was the first fellow from Farmington that I had come in contact with. He lives only a short distance from me and we'll be able to see each other often.

I had almost given up hopes of seeing anyone from Farmington. I've never seen Carl looking better, he's gained quite a bit of weight since I last saw him and is solid as a rock.

I did a big washing and as a result my back is tired. I used a wooden box as a washboard and an old hair brush—you could count the bristles in it—as a scrub brush. I now have dishwater hands and the washday blues.

Be sure and say hello to everyone for me. With Carl and I whaling hell out of the Japs, the war will soon be over.

July 9, 1943

Camp Beale, California

Dear Sirs:

Well here is the first chance I've had to thank you for the wonderful paper that you sent me and I really appreciate them very much. I really want to know what is going on in the town that I come from.

And another thing I want to thank you for the cooperation in being with me way out here in California. It is a long way from home, and it really makes me very happy to hear from you.

If you will put something in the Enterprise for me it will make me very happy and I'm sure you will put it in for me. My name is Frank W. Campeau. I'm a Corporal at now and hope to be a Sergeant very soon. I really enjoy the army, out here especially, and I sure would like to hear from you very shortly if I may.

Give my best regards to every boy that entered the army that comes from the good town of FARMINGTON and I think the people back there are very nice. Keep your chin up and we will beat those nasty Axis if it takes us the specified time we need, and we will put everything in this

war to save everything from destruction.

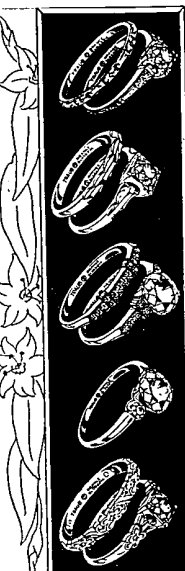
