home front."

The strength and appeal of the book lies in its dominant note—a sense of civic righteousness. The writer passionately believes that "the greatest force in civilization is the collective wisdom of a literate people." He holds that the people expect government to express their highest ideals in both word and act. Any writer with such beliefs who examines and presents the Administration's domestic war record is certain to become indignant over official deviousness and incompetence.



Would you like to know what we carry into battle? One rifle, hayonet, wire cutters, 45 pistol, 100 rounds of ammunition, gas mask, a sack of grenades, trench knife, steel helmet, and some of the fellow have several other things. A grenade is our most effective weapon at night. They will kill at 50 yards. I am writing this out in the open and it is also dark I can hardly see the paper, so I guess I will have to call this a letter.
