

With The Boys In France
Hello Everybody: The other fellows from here are not going to write this time, but they want me to make this a family letter. How would you folks back here like to be up here with us? It sure is great, and we have quite a lot of excitement, and some noise once in a while. This is my third "hitch" and it is also the longest. We will be accustomed to the trenches after this, I guess.

Would you like to know what we carry into battle? One rifle, bayonet, wire cutters, 45 pistol, 100 rounds of ammunition, gas mask, a sack of grenades, trench knife, steel helmet, and some of the fellows have several other things. A grenade is our most effective weapon at night. They will kill at 50 yards. I am writing this out in the open, and it is so dark I can hardly see the paper, so I guess I will have to call this a letter.

TEN YEARS AGO (August 31, 1933)

Manufacturing Company Starts Production
Production was started by the Farmington Manufacturing Company plant Thursday. Four thousand castings were furnished the plant for the machining of pulleys and more casting will be sent when the present job is completed. The castings are sent from the Ford foundry at Northville.

Thayer School Sends Pupils To Novi
Grade school pupils of the Thayer No. 3 fractional district will be sent to the Novi school this year. It was decided at a special district meeting Monday night. The Novi school opens on September 11 and the bus will pick up the children between 8:00 and 8:30 a.m. as the school hours begin at 9:00 a.m.

Four Have Narrow Escape In Fire
Four persons narrowly escaped death early Saturday by sliding from a second story window on an improvised rope-ladder consisting of three bed sheets during a spectacular fire which destroyed the home of J. Rowland Lowers, real estate broker, in Pasadena Park subdivision, Orchard Lake and 11 Mile Roads. Only a chimney was left standing of the eight room house after the blaze. Property damage was estimated at \$12,000.
