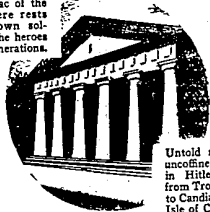


**Ear Stopper**

## RED POINTS ARE WELL USED IN THIS MENU

Maybe you've been saving your red points for something special? Why not try this for a nice dinner. I had always called it Mock Duck, but the recipe says

### STUFFED FLANK STEAK

- 2 lbs flank steak
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 3 tbs. shortening
- 2 cups tomato juice
- 4 tbs. flour
- 1 clove garlic

Cut the garlic clove in two and rub flank steak on both sides. Season with salt, pepper. Spread stuffing evenly over steak and roll with fibre of meat. Fasten ends together with toothpicks, skewers, or if neither is available, tie with string.

Roll in flour, and brown in hot grease in skillet. Add 1/4 cup of the tomato juice, cover tightly and simmer about two hours, or until meat is tender. It may be necessary to turn occasionally. To serve, remove skewers or string, place on serving platter, add remainder of tomato juice which has been mixed with flour to skillet and cook until thickened. Pour over meat. Cut in slices across fiber of meat.

### DRESSING

- 3 cups bread cubes (bread should be 2 or 3 days old)
- 1/4 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup chopped onions
- 1 tbs. chopped parsley
- 2 tsp. salt
- Dash pepper
- 2 tbs. shortening

Combine the crumbs, parsley, salt and pepper. Meanwhile melt the shortening in a frying pan, add onions and celery, simmer gently until tender. Mix with seasoned bread cubes.

If very dry dressing is used, add 1/4 cup water to bread.

**1 Married A Vagabond**—Rachel Latta Franck. A most delightful and interesting book for spending an evening at home with. The author says, "I never feel as much at home as when my trunk is locked and my hat is on. I like moving on and on, which is lucky." Fortunate indeed is Mrs. Franck, whose husband is a famous vagabond voyager and writer. This book is a personal account of their travels through the West Indies, Japan, China, Korea, Scandinavia, France and England. She has told us her husband's adventures and strange lands and has made a home for her family under most unusual circumstances. This is an intimate glimpse into the life of the Franck family and charming descriptions of their children's reactions to foreign lands and foreign people.

**Two Feet From Heaven**—Perceval Wren. A very interesting story by the writer of "Beau Geste," revealing the conflict between good and evil in the soul of man. Three separate stories merge into one superb story, by the best of story tellers, Percival Wren. It concerns Richard Neytroke, an English vicar, whose past arises to haunt him in the midst of the turmoil just preceding the outbreak of the present war; the story of the woman who helped him escape the consequences of the act which had haunted him through all the years of his respectable married life and the story of the painter, who at the woman's trial, receives the inspiration for his greatest picture.

This dramatic story unfolds in flashbacks to the past and in Neytroke's confessions to the matron of a nursing home, where he goes when the burden of his conscience becomes unbearable.

An absorbing novel by a very good writer. **Knowing Yourself And Others**—Donald McLean. A wonderful book for young people from ten to eighteen and parents of any age, to help them understand their children. It reveals the principles of good living and stimulates the young person to profitable self-training and understanding. The book suggests certain procedures which will widen his or her scope and appreciation of life.

It is the first book that has been written for young people to help them understand their own reaction and apparently the "queer quirks" that all normal teenagers develop. "Knowing Yourself and Others" is a book on psychology for adolescents, written in an easily understandable manner. Actual case histories make this book most interesting and are used to let the young people see their faults and good qualities in a detached manner. The author is Clinical Psychologist Consultant at the Los Angeles Institute of Family Relations.

## THE GARDEN PATH

Fall gardening consists mostly of digging up the tender bulbs and roots harmed by freezing and putting in those hardy ones that need snow for their winter blanket.

Among those we take up are Dahlias and Gladioli. Dahlias should be left in the ground until the frost has completely killed the foliage, and we sincerely hope they have put forth all the blooms they wanted to. We have to wait all summer for their gorgeous flowers that help make fall the riot of color.

Care should be taken in the treatment we give the tubers (or to be correct, the tuberous roots). After the foliage has died down cut the stalks off just above the ground. With a garden fork lift the entire clump and turn upside down on the basement floor to dry off for a few days. Then wash the roots in water, and cut away any rotted parts. Pack in sand or peat moss and keep in a fairly cool place—but do not let them freeze. Take an occasional look at them during the winter and if the tubers appear to be shriveling, sprinkle the sand or moss lightly with water. Dahlias may also be wrapped in paper and stored in the pantry or kitchen during the winter—if you take the same precautions about freezing and drying out. If sprouts should develop in late winter, cut them off about an inch from the plant. Cannas can be lifted and stored the same as Dahlias.

Gladioli are something else we have to take up every year as they will freeze out. They are generally planted at 2 or 3 week intervals so it is necessary that you watch and dig the corms (or bulbs) before the foliage has died down so much that you can't find them.

After digging, dry the bulbs in the open air but not in a strong sunlight, for a few days. Then clean off the dirt, but do not peel off the brown shucks. It's at this time that you separate the corms. An easy and inexpensive way to keep them through the winter is to store them in a box punched with a few holes, and sprinkle generously with naphthalene flakes (powdered mothballs). This helps prevent rot and assures bigger and better blooms the following season.

We have taken up from the ground, now let's put in. It's almost time to put in tulips, hardy lilies, narcissus, crocus and hyacinths. It is best to plant these not too close so they will have room to spread, as these bulbs do better when left in the ground for several years. Plant about 6 inches deep and mulch lightly to prevent heaving (freezing out of the ground) and coming up too soon.
