File Rabbit's Teeth
Overgrown teeth are usually caused by the rabbit breaking one or more front teeth by pulling at the wire of the hutch. The teeth grow long because there is no grinding surface opposite to them. Cut them off with side cutter pliers and file them so that they make a good fit with the opposing teeth. This may have to be done repeatedly, so watch the rabbit's mouth.
