tion for any period up to a year from date of application. The maximum ration allowed for domestic cooking has been increased to 30 gallons a month for the first seven persons. It was formerly 24 gallons for six or seven persons.

Prices set for dry beans

Sales of dry edible beans, 1943 crop, to the Food Distribution Administration, to other country shippers, and to other Governmental agencies designated in Food prices established for the commodity or support prices set for specified classes last April by the War Food Administration. OPA emphasized that all other sales must be made at or below maximum prices established in Maximum Price Regulation No. 270.

Restrict dry onion shipment

To insure orderly distribution for the short available supply of dry onions to the armed forces and civilians, all shipments in excess of 100 pounds in exceptional onion producing states have been put on a permit basis by the Office of Defense Transportation and the Interstate Commerce Commission. Dry onion movements by common, contract or private motor carriers and by rail wagon and contract carriers are subject to permits issued by the War Food Administration. Applications for permits should be made to local WFA representatives in the principal onion producing areas—California, Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon, Utah, and Washington.

Sugar To Save Bees

Beekeepers who are facing loss of their bees because of lack of sufficient natural food, may obtain sugar substitutes if they are registered with OPA as industrial users. The supplemental allotment is limited to a maximum of 15 pounds per bee colony per year. Applications should be made in person or by mail to the local rationing board.

Cabbage Seed Selling Prices

Culling prices for 1943 cabbage seed have been made the same as for the 1943 crop, according to a recent OPA amendment.

Shrimp Prices Cut

Down payment required to buy housing in rent-controlled areas has been reduced from 3 1/3 per cent to 20 per cent. OPA amended the regulation because of easing the housing situation.

Gasoline For School Buses

School buses in districts where school authorities have delayed in filing necessary applications or have failed to organize routes in accordance with the school bus conservation policy may get temporary gasoline allotments. The Office of Defense Transportation authorized this action so that school children would not lack school transportation.

Report Good Wheat Crop In Italy

In spite of the war, the Italian wheat crop this year is believed to have been as large or even larger than the pre-war average, according to the Office of Foreign Agricultural Relations of the Department of Agriculture. The 1943 crop may have amounted to as much as 280 million bushels. That estimate compares with unofficial estimates of 269 million bushels last year.

British 'Save Fuel'

Britons have been asked by the Ministry of Fuel to be even more sparing of home comforts this winter than they were last winter. The British Information Services reported recently. By lowering room temperatures in their homes, by using less hot water, by getting along with less light, and by cutting down on fuels used in cooking, the British saved four million tons of coal in the winter of 1942-1943. This year the Ministry has urged that economies be pushed further so that six million tons of coal can be saved. As was the case last winter, this winter's fuel saving in Britain will be on a voluntary basis. There will be no rationing but Britons will be expected to base their fuel consumption

on a chart prepared by the Ministry of Fuel.

About Those Free Matches

If your tobacco dealer gave you free matches—the wood or the book variety—during March, 1942, when he sold you your tobacco products, he must continue to give them to you now. Sales through vending machines are included in the new OPA ruling on matches.

Anti-Freeze Distributed

To insure an ample supply of volatile antifreeze mixtures for passenger cars in 14 western states before cold weather sets in, WPA ordered industrial alcohol manufacturers with national distribution to supply specified quotas to the states upon receipt of orders from dealers. Each state will receive a supply equal to one and one-half gallons per passenger car registered. States involved are: Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

Notification Of 'Next Of Kin'

Notification of "next of kin" of Naval personnel killed, missing, wounded, or captured — except where death occurs within the continental limits—is generally a telegram giving such available information as may be divulged. In case of death this telegram is confirmed by a letter from the Secretary of the Navy, conveying condolences and giving any additional details. Next of kin are also furnished data as to rights and benefits to which they are entitled. In the case of a "missing" person, the next of kin receives a letter about the continuance of allotments for insurance premiums and for dependents.

If the Navy receives further details of the casualty, next of kin are promptly notified.
