**For Stains in Wool**  
For removing stains from wool and silk materials, use mild acids and avoid all strong alkalis. Any bleach that contains chlorine will destroy wool and silk. Sodium perborate or hydrogen peroxide are good bleaching agents to use on wool and silk. Use only lukewarm water for wool and silk, for hot water shrinks wool and injures the finish on silk.

**Used as Blood Filter**  
Nylon cloth of very fine weave is used as a filter in preparing blood plasma for transfusion into wounded fighting men, and small nylon filter bags have been adopted for transfusion kits by Philadelphia General hospital, one of the country's largest hospitals. The nylon filters have advantages over other filter materials in that they are inexpensive, do not clog and are easy to clean.
