COLLECTION OF SCRAP PAPER IS GUARANTEED

Drew Pearson, in his syndicated
column, states: "One contrib-
uting factor in the increasing pa-
per shortage has been lack of
'boy-power' or other collective
forces to collect scrap paper, plus
lack of a War Production Board
appearing to get a paper collec-
tion campaign humming."

The fact of the matter is that
paper mills relying on waste pa-
per used in the manufacture of
medicine containers, airplane sig-
nals, parachute flares, plane wing
tips and parts, have had to shut
down for lack of newspapers,
magazines and wrapping paper.

Uncle Sam actually needs
8,000,000 tons of scrap paper right
now. The lack of it has necessitated
the use of raw wood pulp,
which has contributed to the
shortage of newspaper on which
all newspapers rely. A further
curtailment, already imminent is
either forcing newspapers out of
business or making necessary the
elimination of features, advertis-
ing and the presentation of news
in a briefer form.

As an Official Government Col-
lection Agency for old newspa-
pers, magazines, wrapping pa-
per, photograph records, kitchen
fats, the Society of Good Neigh-
bors of Detroit has extended their
pick-up truck service into De-
troit's suburban areas for the
purpose of assisting the Govern-
ment in its war effort. The 'Good
Neighbors' trucks call upon in-
vitation only due to gas and time
conservation regulations. Their
phone number is Hogarth 8300,
Detroit.

The Society of Good Neighbors
is that nonsectarian, non-profit,
Detroit charity who have been so
prompt in extending emergency
relief to distressed families in this
area, about whom little is heard
because of overshadowing war
news.

They state that many of our
readers would be shocked and
astonished at the need of unfor-
tunate families, war widows, un-
employed, unemployed workers,
and children, for old clothing,
house furnishings, rugs, stoves,
kitchenware and toys. These 'dis-
cards' are cleaned, repaired, and
their utility extended to the needs
of worthy, though unfortunate,
Detroiters, boy in dire straits.
This worthy undertaking is one
meriting the support of humani-
tarians throughout this area.

OLD CHRISTMAS CARDS MAY HELP A SOLDIER BOY
