CHICAGO.—With 1944 food pro-duction goals calling for new peak outputs of food, fiber and oil crops from Michigan farms, every avail-able acre, a gricultural imple-ment and ton of fertilizer will be en-listed in the crusade, according to a statement made public here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Com-mittee.

"New goals for the United States propose the use of some 330 million acres of crop land—by far the larg-est ever used," says the statement.
