(Continued from Page Two) has ruled that any local board or special hearing officer, after a proper hearing and a finding that the tire or gasoline regulations have been violated, may not revoke a gasoline ration, but also may prohibit use of gasoline in the violator's possession which was obtained as part of the ration.

Civilian Meat Supply
About two-thirds (67 per cent) of the United States supply of meat available for all needs in 1944 has been allocated to U.S. civilians, according to the War Food Administration. This allocation will allow about the same per capita civilian meat consumption in 1944 as in 1942. On a dressed weight basis, it is equivalent to approximately 132 pounds per capita for the year compared with the pre-war 1935-39 average of about 126 pounds.

Park And Beans Released
About 440,000 cases (approximately 29 million pounds) of canned pork and beans will be released to civilian consumers within the next few weeks.

Price Rise In 43 Was Small
At the end of 1943, the general level of prices in wholesale markets was two per cent higher than at the close of 1942, and the prices of staples that families buy in retail markets for everyday living went up about three and one-half per cent. This price rise was smaller than in any year since

1940, according to Frances Perkins, Secretary of Labor.

Opportunity For Veterans
Returning war veterans may enter virtually any of the 30,207 apprentice training programs in the United States. Also restrictions and other limitations have been especially lifted for veterans in many apprenticeship standards so they may obtain training for skilled work, according to the War Manpower Commission.

More Tea For Civilians
About 75 million pounds of tea will be available to civilian consumers in 1944—wartime limitations on shipping space permitting. This is about 16 million pounds more than civilians got in 1943.

Lead-Lense Farm Machinery
Less than 3 per cent of the United States production of farm machinery went for Lead-Lense between March 31, 1941, and November 1, 1943, according to the President's thirteenth report to Congress on Lead-Lense operations. Allied need for farm machinery was increased because of military demands. American flying fortresses now use aircraft which four years ago were among Britain's best farms, thus necessitating reclamation of marshes and rough hill land for farm acreage. When Australia was threatened by Japanese invasion early in 1942, thousands of Australian farm tractors were conscripted for construction of military roads and airfields. Moreover, British and Australian farm machinery manufacturing facilities early in the war had been converted to ordnance production.

Shark Meat in Demand
The demand for shark meat has suddenly grown to such proportions along the eastern seaboard that fishermen are unable to fill their orders, so the Office of the Co-ordinator of Fisheries announces. Samples of quick-frozen shark steaks and filets were recently shipped to Washington, D. C., and other eastern and southern areas. Restaurant managers and food distributors were so enthusiastic that their orders have already exceeded the supply for the immediate future. Shark is white meat, comparing with the swordfish in texture and with haddock in flavor.

Post-war applications of nylon will probably range from evening dresses and men's shirts to featherweight tent; scuffproof shoes; easily cleaned automobile upholstery; rustless window screens; and sash cords that should last almost as long as the house.

Made Civilian Prison
Alcatraz Island is in San Francisco Bay about 1 1/2 miles from the mainland and contains about 12 acres. For years it was used as a military prison, but it was made into a federal prison for dangerous and incorrigible convicts in 1934, when 48 individuals were transferred to the prison, the capacity of which is 600 prisoners. The convict cars were placed on a freight barge, which was towed by tug boats.

Pilgrimage to Mecca Goal

Of 250 Million Moslems
War prosperity and safer sea routes may result this year in a larger pilgrimage to Mecca, Holy City to a quarter of a billion followers of Mohammed. Mohammed was born at Mecca and there his vision of the unity of God took shape. Mecca, situated in Saudi Arabia, is a city of 400,000 people, about 45 miles inland from the Red sea port of Jidda.

Pilgrims from Africa and southern Asia usually come by the Red sea route, leaving at Jidda in motor fleets of luteen-rigged sambuks or small Arab dhows, but the manner of pilgrimage is not prescribed by the Koran.

From India's 60 million followers large delegations come by sea. Pilgrims from the Union of South Africa, from Africa's east-central countries where there are 23 million Muslims, and from Madagascar, sailed around the eastern shoulder of Africa.

Asia Minor's pilgrims usually traveled overland, partly by rail and partly on the rest of the way by camel caravan. In some years the caravan from Cairo has included 5,000 people, 30,000 camels.

In 1939 the French government provided a ship for its colonies. It sailed through the Mediterranean sea under British naval escort.

CAN OPENERS STILL PERFORM A GREAT TASK

Rationing has not emptied the shelves of Oakland County residents of canned foods it was revealed today, a total of 1,886,456 cans being used monthly, according to A. H. Nugent, general sales manager of the American Can Company.

Mr. Nugent based his figure on the government's compilation of 279,475 ration book holders in the county and the statement of the U.S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics that the per capita consumption of canned goods so far this year is 225 cans a day. On the basis of the average size of ration card, approximately 4,559 pounds of pure metallic tin is required for the war effort from these cans, he explained.

Save electricity to save coal!

Every citizen needs a clover and every clover a grass, but clover seems to abhor any combination of poor, wet, or sour land of any kind, Lancaster explains. On practically all other poor soils within 30 inches rainfall, one or more of the clovers will respond to phosphate and lime.

God with clover is the best known means to restore organic matter and thereby revitalize worn-out crop land. Lancaster says that in certain experiments grass and clover yielded three times as much forage and four times as much protein as grass alone. Also, the clover reduced weed infestation from 33 per cent to only 4.

First Air Express
It was on September 1, 1927, that the first regularly scheduled air express service was started in the United States. At some 25 cities from coast to coast, airline and express officials witnessed the start of an air cargo service destined to grow from 17,000 shipments in 1925 to more than 1,405,000 shipments last year.

Many of the first mail and express ships were single-engined, open cockpit biplanes. Packages were stowed wherever there was room. Often the pilot sat on the cargo. Coast-to-coast shipments required 36 hours and 16 refueling stops compared with present-day 16-hour, overnight transcontinental flights. Today's inter-city schedules are twice as fast as those of 16 years ago, while rates are one-third what they were in 1927. A 25-pound package from New York to the West coast cost \$65 in 1927; today the rate is \$21. The most recent rate reductions took effect July 15, were the result of how growing air express volume benefits the shipper.

Borax Aids Alfalfa
An application of from 20 to 35 pounds of borax per acre, along with the regular fertilizer, is one of the chief secrets in successfully growing alfalfa, report agronomists. This small application of borax cures "alfalfa yellows," which is a leaf trouble, and it keeps the plants in a vigorous condition. The maintenance of a much better stand, according to the agronomists. Borax response is so outstanding that failure to get uniform distribution will result in streaks through the field. One application of borax will last for several years. Growers are warned not to apply more than 50 pounds per acre because relatively large applications produce a toxic effect and damage the crop.

Plant Storage
When storing plants should be kept away from the furnace, yet kept away from outside freezing, too. Most root vegetables should be kept as cold as possible without letting them freeze, that is, the temperature range kept between 32 and 40 degrees. At least one window in the storage room is valuable, since it can provide ventilation and carry off odors, as well as regulate temperature. Windows should be darkened to keep light away from the vegetables. Natural earth makes a very good floor for storage rooms, as it holds moisture better than concrete or brick.
