
Beds And Small Plots
When growing crops in beds, or
where limited garden area makes

close together, broadcast the plant
food, applying either by hand or
with a spreader. If applied by
hand, put half the required
amount on lengthwise, and the
other balf on crosswise. This assures a more even distribution.

Row Planting

On large plots where the rows are widely spaced, it is more economical to apply plant food to the row, rather than broadcast it over the entire garden area. Exhaustive placement tests indicate that the very best results are achieved when the plant food is placed increws should be deep enough to allow the placing of the plant food one to one-and-one-half inches below the planted seed or seed piece. Plant food should be applied at the rate of one quart (two pounds) per 50 feet of row. That is, one plant food one to one-and-one-half inches below the planted seed or seed plece.
