Women War Workers:

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2. Fix a "Hearty Salad." Wash and prepare vitamin-rich celery, carrots, radishes, onions and raw cabbage. 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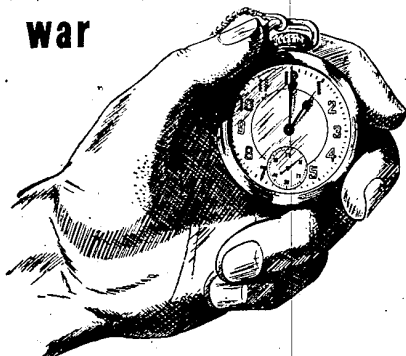
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
