WHEN the last strains of the music have died away at the wedding ceremony, voices start to buzz and tension is relaxed. Congratulations are in order and it is time to toast the bride. What to serve for refreshments? If it's a simple reception at home, here's the answer. An entree or salad, dessert, bride's cake and plenty of coffee.

Our photograph shows an attractive table setting with Coffee Ice Cream Meringues and silver coffee service. Nothing could be more appropriate to such a festive occasion. Bring out the coffee service and let it share honors with the wedding cake. But be sure your coffee is fresh and strong and full of real coffee flavor. Here are the recipes for the Meringues and Refrigerator Coffee Ice Cream.

Meringues
3 egg whites
4 cup sugar
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 tsp cream of tartar
1/2 tsp vanilla or lemon extract

Beat egg whites until stiff and dry. Beat in gradually 1/2 cup sugar at a time. Fold in remaining sugar and vanilla extract. Drop meringues by tablespoons on un-

pressed baking sheet, piling mixture high in center. Bake in slow oven (275° F.) about 40 to 45 minutes, until meringues are dry on the surface and will slip off the sheet easily. Remove from sheet with wet knife. Ice meringues are to be served with ice cream, press in bottom crust. Yield: 10 medium-sized or 18 small meringues or kisses.

Refrigerator Coffee Ice Cream
1 1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tsp salt
1/2 tsp cream of tartar
1 cup strong coffee

Chill evaporated milk several hours in refrigerator. Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup cold coffee. Heat remainder of coffee, and stir into gelatin. Add sugar and salt, stir until dissolved. Chill in refrigerator until very thick. Whip evaporated milk and syrup. Fold into beaten egg whites. Remove from tray to bowl, beat well, and return to tray to finish freezing. If desired sprinkle with chocolate chips. Yield: 1 quart.
