KEITH JOHNSON AWARD COMMITTEE TO MAKE CHOICE

Again this year the best school citizen of the Senior Class is being sought. Their attitude on the floor—their fine spirit of sportsmanship to the visiting team, to the referees, and to each other have earned them the esteem and admiration of the entire community.

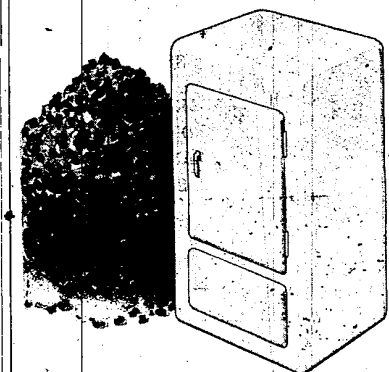
To our coaches, Captain of the first team, and Chapman of the B team, goes much of credit for this year's successes. We realize that many hours of planning, work and worry went before each and every game.

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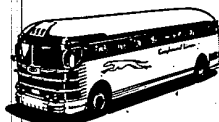
