Mr. Moore stated that the war has brought prosperity to many families, but it has increased the number of children who depend on the County for care and sup-

"We need to place these children in boarding homes because such normal home life is far superior to any institutional care and because our Juvenile Home is rowded.

"We furnish clothes, medical attention, school supplies and pay \$6.00 weekly board. Obviously this barely covers the cost of such care, but there are other compensations which come through furselfish service to small children! Anyone who can and will take

Anyone who can and will take some of these children into their home is asked to write to Judge Moore in care of the Juvenile Court, and he will see that a representative calls on you to ex-plain the details and answer any questions you may have.
