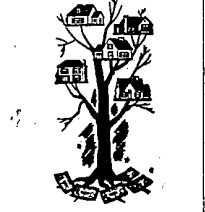

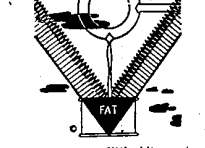

## Liquor Renewals Approved

### Eleven Applications Presented To Board

At a special meeting of the Farmington Township Board, held Tuesday evening in the Farmington Town Hall, applications for renewal of liquor licenses for establishments operating in the Township were received and passed upon. All members of the Board were present, with the exception of Supervisor Ernest V. Blanchard.

Six Class C licenses and five Tavern licenses were approved, all by a vote of three affirmative and one negative.

Class C liquor licenses, which permit the sale of hard liquor by the glass were approved for the following:

Louis Waack, who operates the tavern on Grand River Avenue, just east of Middle Belt Road.

Helen Waack, who operates the restaurant on Grand River Avenue, just west of the Cut-Off.

Tom Simpson of 34505 Grand River Avenue.

Arthur P. Coe who operates Coe's Bar at Eight Mile and Grand River.

Glen Oaks Golf Club, 13 Mile and Orchard Lake Road.

William Schaefer of Fourteenth Mile and Orchard Lake Roads, Giffey Gagnon, 12 Mile and Middle Belt Road, who was also granted a license.

Paul Parrinello, Eight Mile and Orchard Lake Roads, and the Franklin Hills Country Club.

Those who applied for, and were granted Tavern licenses, permitting the sale of beer and wine, were William Schaefer of Fourteenth Mile and Orchard Lake Roads, Giffey Gagnon, 12 Mile and Middle Belt Road, who was also granted a license; and Paul Parrinello, Eight Mile and Orchard Lake Roads, and the Franklin Hills Country Club.

James P. Gott, who operates the Korner Kitchen at Twelve Mile and Orchard Lake Road, did not ask for renewal of the Tavern license which he held last year.

It is expected that all licenses, approved by the Board, will be granted by the Michigan State Liquor Control Commission.

## STAR FEDERATION INSTITUTE IS OPEN TO ALL

## TAX EXEMPTION AFFIDAVITS MUST BE FILED

Supervisor Ernest V. Blanchard is requesting this week, that all persons who are now in the service of the country, and who own property in Farmington Township, should file, or cause to be filed, an affidavit, proving the ownership of their property, which may then be withheld from sale, due to non-payment of taxes.

It is the duty of the County Treasurer to withhold from sale all property belonging to a person now in the military services of the United States as well as to extend other benefits on application, under Act 131, P.A. of 1943 and The Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief Act of the United States, as amended in 1942.

Those desiring their property to be withheld must furnish a description and affidavit, establishing their ownership, and see that it is in the hands of the supervisor on or before April 25, 1944.
