CANDIDATE FOR REPRESENTATIVE



HOWARD R. ESTES

Howard R. Estes, member of the Birmingham City Commission and owner and operator of the Indian Craft and Gift Shop on West Maple Street, Birmingham, has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination of representative in the Third District of Oakland County in the state legislature.

Oakland County has just been re-districted and given five members in the House of Representatives instead of two as formerly. Under this new plan District Three will include Troy Township, Birmingham City, Bloomfield Hills City, Bloomfield Township, West Bloomfield Township, Commerce Township, Milford Township, Lyon Township, City of South Lyon, Novi Township, Farmington Township, City of Farmington and that portion of Northville in Oakland County.

Howard R. Estes was born in Alpena, Mich., in 1894, was graduated from Alpena high school in 1913 and from Michigan State College in 1917. He is a World War I veteran, serving as an enlisted man and later as a commissioned officer. He is a Mason, member of the American Legion and the Birmingham Rotary Club. He is serving as president of the latter organization at the present time.

Mr. Estes is a member of Christ Church, Cranbrook.
He resides at 492 Rivenook, in Birmingham, with his wife. Their son, Howard, is serving with the U.S. Army Engineers, and is stationed in England.

Mr. Estes has held executive positions with the Flint Health Department and the American Child Health Association of New York City. He entered commercial dairy work with the Research Laboratories of an eastern company, was transferred to New York and later to Detroit. He started his own business, a gift shop, in 1939, in Birmingham, and continues to own and operate it.

He has been active in Birmingham civic affairs during the past five years. In 1943 Mr. Estes served as president of the Birmingham Community Council. He was elected to the City Commission in 1942 and more recently has served as one of the Birmingham members on the Oakland County Board of supervisors. Mr. Estes has also been active in Victory Garden promotion and Bond Sales.

"I am seeking the Republican nomination as state representative in the July primary because I am interested in civic affairs and good government and I believe I can contribute something to that cause. It nominated and later elected I will endeavor to fill the position actively, with sincerity and integrity. Shortly I will issue a statement which I believe will be of interest to residents of this newly created district."

SAFETY AWARDS ISSUED TO COUNTY SCHOOLS

Excellent traffic safety work in twelve Oakland County schools was recognized this week by the Safety and Traffic Division of the Automobile Club of Michigan.

A banner was awarded to the Drayton Plains Public School for regular and uniform reporting of Safety Patrol activities.

Honor Trophy plaques were awarded to Clarkston Public, Farmington, Clarensville Central, Edgewood, Our Lady of Sorrows, Pleasanton, Highland Public, Keego Harbor, Roosevelt, Novi Public, Oxford, Daniel Axford, Rochester, Siles and Walled Lake Consolidated Schools, not only for patrol activities, but also for a high standard of safety instruction throughout the school year. Banner awards were made to 471 Michigan schools, and 1,287 were awarded plaques.

"Michigan schools' record in safety work this year has been very gratifying and has been greatly extended," said Ernest P. Davis, director of the club's safety and traffic division. "In a society upset and nervous because of war activities—at a time when ordinary American courtesies are taking a terrific beating through disunity and thoughtlessness—it is good to know that our schools are trying to keep alive the principles of safety that will face their supreme test when peace comes."

"Reports to my office do not show any alarming increase in traffic accidents among the lower age groups, as might be expected when parents are forced to relax somewhat their supervision because in many instances both parents are active in war production. The schools must be given much credit for this condition. We must, however, be prepared and vigilant for the day when war-time restrictions are removed from travel and traffic hazards will of necessity become greatly multiplied. Our hope of avoiding heartless losses of life and limb lies in training our children in good safety habits."
