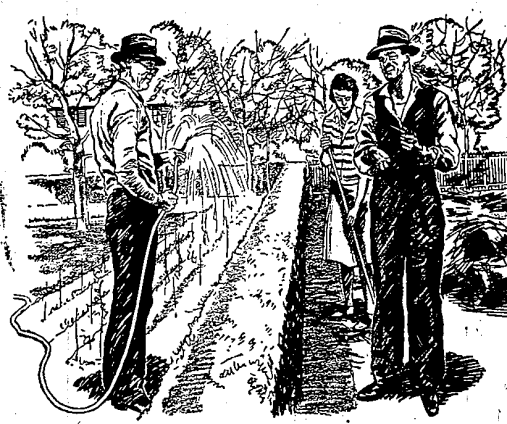
Corinne Calkins
