Somewhere in New Guinea
April 27, 1944

Dear Enterprise:

Just received the March 16th copy of your paper. I wish to thank you from the bottom of my heart. The home town paper is one of the most heart warming things that a fellow can receive from home. I assure you it is enjoyed very much by both myself and the fellows around me.

The only excuse I can offer for not writing sooner is the old army standby, the lack of time.

I'm down here in New Guinea where you can get a sun tan in five minutes and the rain follows right along trying to wash it off. We have a well practiced trick all of our own. That is walking through knee deep mud and dodging coconuts at the same time. It's quite difficult at first but you soon learn how to pull

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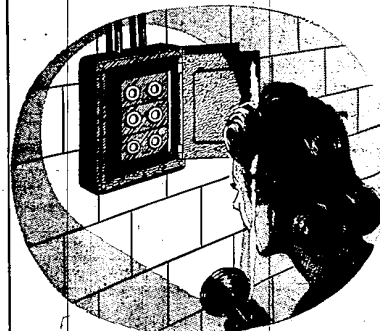

STOP FUSE TROUBLE



before it happens!

It's no fun sitting in the dark simply because a blown fuse has plunged your house into a blackout. Most fuse trouble can be stopped before it happens by observing a few simple precautions.

(1) Frayed lamp cords and extension cords are often responsible for short circuits. Such frayed cords are dangerous. Have them repaired BEFORE they cause trouble. (Don't loop cords over a nail. Don't kink cords or tie them in knots. Don't run cord through a door jamb or under rugs.) (2) Never put an electric appliance in water. Never poke at the element of your electric toaster (or any other appliance) with a fork or sharp tool, whether turned on or off. (3) Don't connect too many appliances and extra lamps on one circuit. (4) Be careful not to overload your washer, or feed too many pieces of clothing through the wringer at one time. The same is true of your ironer. (5) Disconnect appliances by pulling on the plug—never jerk out the cord. Do not let cords come in contact with water, grease or acids. (6) If a faulty lamp or appliance burns out a fuse, disconnect it at once—and don't use again until it has been repaired.

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
