

Pastor Clifford Of Calvary Dies

The Rev. Patrick J. Clifford, who led Calvary Baptist Church of Plymouth to four-fold growth during his 32 years as its pastor, died of a heart attack in his Plymouth home early Thursday.

The well-known clergyman, who left his work at Calvary last May 23 to follow a mission ministry, had apparently been recuperating well from two major surgeries during the last few months.

Death came on the day that he and his wife, Helen, were planning to leave for a Florida vacation. Suitcases had been packed into the car for a Thursday departure from their home at 452 Maple.

REV. CLIFFORD, 63 at the time of his death, first came to Calvary in 1949. He saw the church through three building expansions, culminating in 1966 with the construction of its present church home at 43065 Joy.

During his years there, membership of the church quadrupled.

Last summer he announced he was leaving the Calvary pulpit to become minister at large for the Berean Mission, Inc., with headquarters in St. Louis, Mo., and to continue as a consultant for the Michigan Sunday School Association.

He had kept busy with both callings until taken ill a few months ago.

Pastor Clifford was born in 1908 in Oakville, Ont. He graduated from high school there and graduated from Denver Bible College in Denver, Colo.

His only church pastorate before coming to Plymouth was 9½ years as minister of the Three Rivers Bible Church in Three Rivers, Mich. He and his wife were married there.

He also served from 1946 to 1949 as director of the Church Service Center in Detroit, working first with servicemen and later with young people in the city.

Dr. Maxey Will Speak In Westland

DR. MAXEY is noted as a specialist in theology as related to women. Besides lecturing in a number of universities, she has written "The Authority of the Symbol" and "Beyond Eve and Mary."

She is assistant professor in the department of religious studies at the University of Detroit.

In her talk, she will deal with the ideas and opinions of Christians of the past as they relate to women. She will update the subject by discussing the role of women in society and religion.

Have women been treated unjustly in the past by an uneducated male population? What is happening today that either degrades or uplifts women, she has written. These questions and others will be presented along with a series of pictures to augment the material.

DR. MAXEY earned her doctor of theology degree in Christian ethics at the Union Theological Seminary, New York City. She also has an MA in systematic theology and medieval philosophy and a BA in philosophy.

Future programs will deal with "The Egg, Holder of Life, Symbol for Man, Artist's Canvas," on March 10; "Glass and Ancient Religions," on April 14; and "Wonders with Weeds," on May 12.

Peace And Pluralism Youth Seminar Topics

New ideas on world peace and world pluralism are being reported in Methodist churches and youth group meetings all over eastern and Upper Michigan as the result of a recent excursion to New York and Washington.

The trip, a seminar sponsored by the Detroit United Methodist Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns and Missions, involved 132 young people, including two from Newburg United Methodist Church, Norman Leach of Livonia and Kim Greenwood of Plymouth.

Visits to the United Nations and New York churches, a tour of Harlem, a day in the U.S. Capitol, talks with Congressmen and some rappelling among themselves contributed to the ideas on peace and pluralism they carried away from the Jan. 22-28 seminar.

"THE REV. BEN BOHNSACK, associate minister of Newburg United Methodist Church, was director of the seminar, and the Rev. Dean Klump, associate minister of the First United Methodist Church of Plymouth, was one of the adult sponsors. Both their wives were also among the youths who accompanied the adults.

Rev. Klump will report on the seminar when he preaches at the Plymouth church at the 9 and 11 a.m. services Sunday, Feb. 13. His topic will be "The Global and Personal Issues of Peace."

The ideas of both peace and pluralism were central to the seminar, Rev. Bohnsack said. "By pluralism," he added, "we meant exposing the youth to different life styles and ideas. We wanted to help them meet with people of differing philosophies and form their own ideas about how people and nations differ and are alike."

Then the entire group gathered for a meeting with U.S. Senator Philip Hart.

A final evening communion service, in which each par- ticipant broke bread and shared his cup with those with whom he had found the most meaningful relationships, climaxed the seminar.

THE GENERAL THEME of the seminar, as Rev. Klump put it, was to find ways to be responsible Christians and to work for peace in the nation and the world.

To this end, the adult leaders had each youth give his definition of peace when the meeting days were concluded.

"Peace is love," one youth answered. Other definitions included "Peace is the United Nations," "Peace is being black and liking a white person," "Peace is impossible," and perhaps in summation of a long-remembered experience, "Peace is 132 instant friends."

Rep. Griffiths Is St. Agatha Series Speaker

Congressman Martha Griffiths, Democrat from Michigan's 17th district, will be the speaker for the next St. Agatha Catholic Church educational forum.

Her talk at 8 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 17, will consider "Equality of Women in Modern Society."

MRS. GRIFFITHS first was elected to her seat in the U.S. House of Representatives in 1954 and has served ever since. She now is a member of the powerful Ways and Means Committee and also serves on the Joint Economic Committee and is chairman of its fiscal policy subcommittee.

Her special legislative interests have been directed toward social security, Medicare, tax and welfare reform and fiscal policy.

INTERESTED in correcting injustices confronting women in employment, she is

sponsor of the Equal Rights Amendment and successfully guided its passage through the House in the 91st Congress.

She also has introduced a major health insurance proposal designed to make comprehensive health care services available to all Americans.
