# Rev. Lester Kinsolving's Religion Update

When Massachusetts Democrat Robert Drinan first arrived in Washington a year ago, an initial question of newsmen was what he should be called — as the first Catholic priest ever elected to Congress.

"How about Bobby?" quipped the new congressman from the state of Jack, Bobby and Teddy. "I don't care what they call me, just as long as they call me, just as long as they call me!"

Would he continue to wear his priestly garb while the House was in session? "It's the only clothing I own," explained the Jesuit priest.

A MORE plausible reason for wearing his round collar on the House floor seemed apparent during an exclusive interview with this writer, in which Father Drinan strenuously protested against what he termed "priests being made non-persons."

"Our father who art in Congress," as his supporters joyfully hailed him when he wore the election, appears to have encountered his strongest opposition not from Protestants, but from conservative Catholics.

Politico-comic William F. Buckley, for example, wrote that on the day Drinan was elected, God must have been out to lunch.

"Superb!" countered the immensely affable former dean of Boston College law school, "but whatever God allows is eternal — through all the election days!"

This ultra-conservative line has just recently been picked up by Philadelphia's Archbishop John Cardinal Krol, the recently elected President of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. Cardinal Krol says that a priest "is not to enter the world of partisan politics" or to "invade the competency of the laity." (The cardinal's statement should indeed prove hilarious to those liberal members of the U.S. Catholic Bishops Conference — or to members of the Pennsylvania state legislature, who can attest from vivid experience with his eminence that political competence is by no means confined to the laity.)

BUT DURING his interview with this writer, Father Drinan disclosed that when the issue of his running for office came up in his own Archdiocese of Boston, he was provoked by President Harry Truman to call it "the most un-American thing in America."

Now, ironically, Father Drinan has been appointed a member of this committee, which has the new name of the House Internal Security Committee. He has created a furor by exposing not only the source of income of one of the committee's star witnesses — but the file containing what he described as "raw data taken from right wing journals and allegedly Communist publications from unnamed sources and faceless informers," which included material on 754,000 U.S. citizens.

Here, as well as in his singularly effective opposition to the absurd "prayer amendment," Father Drinan can do so much more than criticize or demonstrate — in a nation which is generally fed to the teeth with demonstrators.

And it is fortunate, indeed, that neither the U.S. Constitution, nor Roman Catholic canon law specifies that when a man is ordained he in any way abdicates his citizenship — including the right to hold public office.



TRIUMPH MAGAZINE, an unofficial Catholic periodical edited by Buckley's sister (and which reads as if it were ghost written by Genghis Khan), contended that Father Drinan should have been welcomed to Washington "with just one word: Resign! — not from Congress, where he fits, but from the priesthood which he has dishonored."
