His long experience in law enforcement, years of work for veterans of all wars and participation in juvenile activities are well known. Oakland voters have a right to demand their Sheriff be a man of ability, experience and leadership. Republicans throughout the county believe that Liddicoat is the one man who can function efficiently as Sheriff.

**WHAT HE WILL DO**

**SHERIFF'S COUNCIL.** Prominent citizens in all sections of the county, will be invited to serve on a Sheriff's Council to keep the sheriff's office informed as to conditions throughout the county. This will eliminate guess work in serving the county.

**RESIDENTIAL PATROL.** The county will be divided into four sections. The deputies in each will constantly patrol their territories, thus enabling them to answer calls quickly. Cross-county driving and long delays will be eliminated. Some sectors of the county report not having seen a deputy in two years. Residential officers will assist the communities' own police. Each community served will have a residential deputy, under a partial payment salary arrangement, together with office and telephone, if they desire it. Radio equipped cars will be available.

**FINGERPRINT USE.** The sheriff's office will make use of its fine fingerprint facilities. In eight years, it is said, no case has been presented in court in which use has been made of the department's fingerprint files. The new sheriff will correct this fault.

**JUVENILE CARE.** A member of the sheriff's staff will be trained in juvenile work. The services of this leader will be available for schools, organizers and parents for counsel and guidance, promoting good citizenship.

**ELIMINATE WASTE.** The honor system will be instituted for members of the sheriff's staffs. Officers on night duty will fuel their cars for use of the day officer in the territory in which each serves, saving gasoline, time and eliminating driving to and from Pontiac.

**CO-OPERATION.** The sheriff's office in the future will co-operate with all law enforcement agencies, F. B. I., State Police, courts, local constables and police officers, greatly improving efficiency of the department.

**OFFICER TRAINING.** Members of the sheriff's force will be trained in proper use of firearms, attend classes, study F. B. I. methods and will conduct themselves as gentlemen.

**VETERANS.** Oakland County has never elected a war veteran as Sheriff. Mr. Liddicoat is a veteran. Police Chief DeVriend of Farmington, who will be under sheriff, also is a veteran. Both are active in veterans' rehabilitation work.

**REVITALIZE STAFF.** Former capable members of the sheriff's force, who resigned because of dissatisfaction with conduct of the office under the present undersheriff, will be invited to join the new administration.
