HUGH LIDDCOAT WOULD APPOINT SHERIFF COUNCIL

Declaring that he will ask prominent Oakland County citizens to serve on a sheriff's council, Hugh L. Liddcoat, Republican candidate for sheriff in the July 11 primary, said today that such a council would contribute to the efficiency of the sheriff's office.

"Men and women from all sections of the county will be invited to advise the sheriff on conditions throughout the county," he said. "I believe a council of this kind will be of great benefit to all residents, and it certainly will eliminate guesswork as to actual conditions."

While advocating formation of the council to better police the county, Liddcoat also offered a number of recommendations for improvement of the administration of the sheriff's office. Among them were creation of residential patrol, dividing the county into four sections; use of the department's fingerprint facilities, elimination of waste, proper training of members of the staff, a trained juvenile expert, and a general revitalizing of the staff.

Liddcoat is an overseas veteran of World War I, is active in veterans' rehabilitation work, and is a member of the Board of Supervisors and the Ferndale City Commission. He has 20 years experience in law enforcement.
