Plenty of grazing crops, a full ration mixture at all times, and a limited amount of grain and protein supplement, will enable growers to produce cheaper hogs.

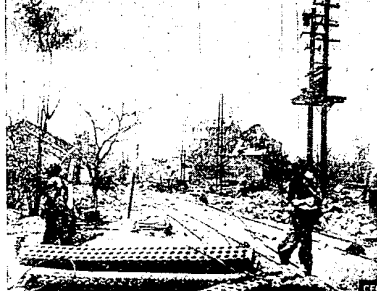
Egg Production
For the entire year 1943 production by farm flocks totaled 53,896,000,000 eggs, a record annual production which exceeded the previous high of 1942 by 12 per cent and the 10-year average by 46 per cent. Peak levels of egg production for the year were reached in all parts of the country because of increased numbers of layers.

Mint Family
Perilla belongs to a group of the mint family of Asiatic origin. It is sometimes used as an ornamental plant because of its bright-colored foliage. The seed yields an oil with the quality of drying rapidly and is, therefore, utilized in the paint and linoleum industries where it is blended with other oils in the manufacture of various varnishes, enamels, linoleums, and allied products. In Japan it was used in the manufacture of paper umbrellas, oil papers and artificial leather. Imports of verilla oil into the United States in 1935, amounted to approximately 75,000,000 pounds at a value of \$1,000,000. It is produced in Manchuria, perilla oil, or Su-Tzu as it is known, is used as a fuel for lamps; a vehicle for pigments especially on metal objects where its rapid drying qualities are needed; in some cases as a food; and as a fence row to protect edible forage crops from animals. Apparently the strong pungent odor of perilla was sufficient to act as a barrier against grazing livestock.

Cement Clinkers
A new process for simultaneously producing cast iron and Portland cement clinker in rotary kilns has reportedly been used successfully in Spain, Germany, Denmark and Japan, but has not been tried in the United States.

Rag Rugs
In washing rag rugs, soak rugs in cold water for about five minutes. Then spread them on a clean board or floor, and sprinkle heavily with any good washing powder. Scrub them with a clean broom or brush dipped in hot water, rinse thoroughly in clear water, and hang on a line to dry. A hose turned on them after planing to the line will rinse them thoroughly.

Rheumatic Fever Strikes Children, Impairs Heart

Rheumatic fever generally follows an illness of streptococcal type, such as scarlet fever, tonsillitis, pharyngitis and certain kinds of colds. Usually the rheumatic symptoms appear two or three weeks after a youngster has contracted one of the foregoing diseases.

Symptoms fairly typical of rheumatic fever are: inflammation of the joints which is shown by redness, swelling and tenderness in the joints; small hard lumps, or rheumatic nodules, formed under the skin chiefly over bony surfaces and about the joints; and Saint Vitus' dance (chorea), due presumably to the effect of the rheumatic process on nervous tissue.

Whatever outward form the disease takes, its inner work is usually the same. It causes inflammation and swelling of the heart valves which regulate the flow of blood, and frequently as this heals, it leaves the valves puckered and inefficient.

Children are especially susceptible to rheumatic fever, but adults are by no means immune. In an average year it kills five paralytic, and kills more people between the ages of 5 and 44 than pneumonia.

Open Easily
If you want to use soy beans dry or for sprouting, allow the pods to dry on the plant until they lose their fresh green color. Harvest them before a heavy frost and spread out the pods in a warm, dry place until they'll open easily.

Strawberry Mulch
Apply mulch for strawberries after the ground freezes in November, spreading it about 4 to 6 inches deep over the plants. Uncover plants in early April and tramp mulch between rows.

Strawberry Patch
Allow a double acre for strawberries since these should be rotated every three or four years. Healthy runner plants from the old planting may be used in the early spring of the third or fourth season for setting the new patch.
