### Washing Pretties, Makes Curtains Last Longer

Washing is not merely a matter of prettifying the curtains. It is a means of making them last. The sheerer and more fragile your curtains are, the more necessary it is to protect them by washing them as soon as they need it.

Let them soak for about 15 minutes, then squeeze out the blackened water and place in fresh lukewarm suds, either in the washer or tub. ### Tall Brazilian Palm Tree Bears Oil-Rich Nut

Babassu is a tall, fan-shaped palm tree that thrives in northern Brazil. It bears in large clusters a nut the size and shape of a lemon. Each nut contains two to six finger-shaped kernels from which a very useful oil is pressed.

Smooth, yellow-white and pleasant to taste, babassu oil is an excellent substitute for olive oil in all its uses, for pork lard for coconut oil in margarines. It is used in making perfumed soaps and medicinal salves. It is a good lubricant, serves in making varnishes, and many other products of modern chemistry. After yielding two-thirds of their weight as oil, the pressed kernels make meal cakes for livestock.

Since 1924 babassu, mostly in the form of shelled kernels, has come from Brazil to the United States in rapidly increasing volume. Expanding to \$5,000,000 yearly total by 1930, imports do not match demand. Today, with normal supplies of coconut oil and copra cut low by the Japanese embargo of Pacific islands, the uses of babassu oil are fired by government war-agency order.

## Huge Floating Dry Docks Repair Ships at Sea

Instead of damaged warships traveling the thousands of miles from the theaters of action to an American coastal dry dock for repairs, they can be placed in a floating dry dock on the spot in a matter of hours, thus saving precious time.

The floating dry docks are made in two ways: in one piece and in sections. They vary in size from those designed to handle small harbor craft to those capable of servicing the largest modern battleships.

The sections can be submerged and raised about a vessel for maintenance or repair work. When the vessel is in position, water is pumped out of the dock body, and the dock rises, bringing the vessel with it.

Crews bunk comfortably entirely within the watertight hulls of these dry dock sections, which also carry the machinery required to submerge and raise the hull, as well as galleys, showers and other essential facilities for the crew.

## Enact Laws to Govern Increasing Bicycle Traffic

Appearance of a growing number of bicycles on the nation's streets and highways since 1940, coincident with restricted motor vehicle transportation, has led many cities to enact ordinances and take other steps during this period to regulate use of these vehicles.

At present, three of every five cities in the country report an ordinance in effect for the regulation of bicycles, according to information to the American Municipal Association.

The information is based on an analysis by the American Automobile Association of answers from 326 cities in a survey to determine the seriousness of the bicycle problem and steps taken to meet it. The survey indicated that about 54 per cent of the regulatory ordinances have been enacted since 1939.

Most of the cities require registration of bicycles, 116 requiring annual registration and 66 requiring registration whenever bicycle ownership changes hands. The registration fee charged most commonly is 25 cents, with 50 cents next in line. Three of the cities reported a \$1 registration fee.

### Pontine Marshes

From ancient times, popes and kings sought to redeem the malarial Pontine marshes below Rome by drainage and other construction projects. In 1928 the Italian government began reclamation work on a large scale. With the help of the Rockefeller Foundation, the malarial scourge was tamed, as bogs and swamps were gradually cleared of stagnant, mosquito-breeding water. Old Roman canals, which at one time had made parts of this area unlivable and productive, were recultivated and new ones were dug. New roads and new cities were planned. Colonists from the heavily populated provinces of northern and central Italy. Under a combined landowner, government and peasant-colonist arrangement for operating, financing, and working the big farms, field crops such as wheat, barley, alfalfa and sugar beets were developed; vineyards were planted, and the raising of livestock encouraged.

### Develop Mineral Riches

Brazil is using modern public health technique to speed the economic development of her mineral resources. High-grade iron ores and other minerals essential to United Nations war industry.

Public health specialists are pioneering along modern scientific lines in the development of the Rio Doce valley.

They are acting as an advance guard to prepare the way for home-owners and workers at the iron and mica mines and on the railroad.

The valley comprises more than 50,000 square miles. Lying several hundred miles north of Rio de Janeiro, it extends westward from the coastal region for some 350 miles to terminate at the base of a high plateau, said to hold the richest iron ore deposits in the Western hemisphere. Semi-precious stones are another of its resources.

### Floor Colors

The great stimulus given to the production of airplanes by the war resulted in new and unusual attention being given to the color of floors in the assembly plants. Much work had to be done under the wings of the great machines, and workers became acutely conscious of the need of better light for under-the-wing jobs. When the floors were painted white, or light tints, similar to the walls and ceiling, the over-all lighting results were so improved that the efficiency of the workers was improved with it, because they could see better to do their work. Eye-strain, fatigue and fumbling were reduced, and contribution was found to have been made to the general morale of the workers.

### Raw Cabbage

For food value and delicious flavor, raw cabbage dishes are best, but when it is used this way it should be as fresh as possible. It should never be soaked and should be washed quickly. If it is cooked, add meat, flavor for zest or variety, or scallop, it cook it in milk or pan it.

## WHAT HE WILL DO

**SHERIFF'S COUNCIL.** Prominent citizens in all sections of the county, will be invited to serve on a Sheriff's Council to keep the sheriff's office informed as to conditions throughout the county. This will eliminate guess work in serving the county.

**RESIDENTIAL PATROL.** The county will be divided into four sections. The deputies in each will constantly patrol their territories, thus enabling them to answer calls quickly. **JUVENILE CARE.** A member of the sheriff's staff will be trained in juvenile work. The services of this leader will be available for schools, organizations and parents for counsel and guidance, promoting good citizenship.

**ELIMINATE WASTE.** The honor system will be instituted for members of the sheriff's staffs. Officers on night duty will fuel their cars for use of the day officer in the territory in which each serves, saving gasoline, time and eliminating driving to and from Pontiac.

**CO-OPERATION.** The sheriff's office in the future will co-operate with all law enforcement agencies, F. B. I., State Police, courts, local constables and police officers, greatly improving efficiency of the department.

**OFFICER TRAINING.** Members of the sheriff's force will be trained in proper use of firearms, attend classes, study F. B. I. methods and will conduct themselves as gentlemen.

**VETERANS.** Oakland County has never elected a war veteran as Sheriff. Mr. Liddicoat is a veteran, a Police Chief, a DeWitt of veterans, who will be under sheriff, also a veteran. Both are active in veterans' rehabilitation work.

**REVITALIZE STAFF.** Former capable members of the sheriff's force, who resigned because of dissatisfaction with conduct of the office under the present undersheriff, will be invited to join the new administration.
