ANNUAL REPORT - SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5 F.R.L. CITY AND TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON, MICHIGAN, FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30th June 1944

REGULAR ANNUAL MEETING - June 12th, 1944
The annual meeting of School District No. 5 F.R.L. City and Township of Farmington was held in the gymnasium, June 12th, 1944 at the hour of 8:00 p.m. Eastern War Time.
The meeting was called to order by Dr. Z. R. Aschenbrenner, President of the Board of Education. The minutes of the last annual school meeting, June 14, 1943 were read and accepted.
1. President Aschenbrenner called on chairman, Arthur Lamb, of the election board for a report of the results on the election held during the day. Mr. Lamb reported as follows: For member of the Board of Education,

G. F. Weaver 105
Mrs. C. D. Haskins 34
Spoiled ballots 146
Total ballots cast 139

On the question to issue bonds, known as Proposition "A", and stated as follows:
Shall the School District borrow a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing certain parcels of land which have been designated by the Board of Education in regular meeting as being necessary aid to the present school site for the best interest of public education in the district and issue bonds therefor?

The results of the balloting on Proposition "A" were as follows:
Yes 112
No 16
Spoiled 2
Total ballots cast 130

On the question of increasing the millage levy by 5 mills for the year 1944-45, known as Proposition "B" and stated on ballot as follows:
Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against property in the School District for all purposes except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to 8th December 1932 be increased for a period of one year from 1944 to 1945 inclusive to two per cent (2%) of the assessed valuation of all property in the District, as provided in Section 21, Article X of the Constitution of the State of Michigan?

The results of the balloting on Proposition "B" were as follows:

No 26
Spoiled 5
Total ballots cast 146

It was moved by Mr. Howard M. Warner and supported by Mrs. Alice Warner that Dr. Z. R. Aschenbrenner be declared duly elected for a term of three years beginning July 1st, 1944. Motion was carried.

2. It was moved by Mr. Edward M. Warner and supported by Mrs. Delos Hamlin that the result of the balloting on Proposition "A" and Proposition "B" be accepted. Motion was carried.

3. President Aschenbrenner called for suggestions and comments from the audience on local school and educational problems. Mr. Lamb suggested that the future elections in which sticker candidates appear that such candidates obtain the stickers from the Board of Education so that they may be of proper specifications.

Mr. Edwin Louys asked for an explanation of the reasons why Proposition "A" and Proposition "B" were submitted to the district for a vote. Dr. Aschenbrenner explained fully and to the satisfaction of all present that such propositions were necessary in order to acquire additional sites which would be necessary in connection with obtaining Federal funds in the future for an expanded building program.

Mr. Edwin Louys asked for an explanation of the accrediting system and to what extent graduates of Farmington High School are admitted to the leading colleges and universities without entrance examinations. President Aschenbrenner asked Mr. Ayres for an explanation of the accrediting system now in use by most colleges and universities of this part of the United States which are members of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Mr. Ayres explained the satisfaction of all present the aims and hopes of the Association, could be admitted on recommendation by the principal or superintendent to colleges and universities, all members of the Association. Mr. Ayres stressed the desirability for a high standard of scholarship, and explained that only persons of better than average grades could be admitted to a college or university.

Mr. Ayres also mentioned a letter recently received from Dr. Edgar Johnson of the University of Michigan, an inspector of high schools for the North Central Association. Dr. Johnson recently inspected the Farmington Public Schools and returned to Mr. Ayres a very gratifying statement of the condition in which he found our schools. It was suggested by Mrs. Alice M. Warner that Dr. Johnson's letter be published in the Farmington Enterprise.

It was moved by Mr. Howard M. Warner, supported by Mrs. Alice M. Warner that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried. Adjournment at 9:15 p.m.
