

Poultry Ration
Experimental work has shown that poultry require somewhat less phosphorus and calcium in their feed when vitamin D is amply supplied than when minimum amounts are used. This means that vitamin D can, in part, compensate for a lowered phosphorus content in the feed by adding extra amounts of this vitamin. However, this does not imply that by adding plenty of vitamin D the phosphorus and calcium content of feeds can be disregarded.

Dry Beans
It takes 1 to 2 1/2 hours to cook dry beans (on the stove). In a pressure cooker, cook beans 30 to 40 minutes at 10 pounds pressure.

Garden Equipment
A few simple, sturdy garden tools, well cared for, are all that most gardeners require to do good work. Tools used for hand preparation of the soil are a square-nosed spade or spading fork and a steel-toothed rake. These and other metal tools, such as wheel hoe, pruning shears and knife, lawn mower, and wheelbarrow, should be cleaned of dirt, and the working parts wiped with an oil rag after use. Tools should be kept in a dry place, such as a garage or tool shed.

Modern lighting equipment in conjunction with walls, ceilings and floors painted in good light-reflecting colors improve such unfavorable conditions.

fessional organization for attorneys, has been widely commended by state officials, state legislators and newspaper editors for its reaffirmation of ethics whereby lawyer-members of the State Legislature are restrained from accepting fees from persons or groups having special interest in legislative actions.

There have been rumors at Lansing, some of which were linked to the grand jury investigations, that lawyer-members had accepted fees from regular clients who were affected currently by pending legislation. The action by the State Bar's committee on ethics makes it clear that such a practice has been, and is now, considered to be unethical. Like Caesar's wife, lawyer-legislators should be above suspicion.

Actually, it is understood that the reaffirmation has been considered for nearly one year and was not prompted by any investigation into alleged legislative graft at Lansing.

Associate Justice Frank Murphy of the United States Supreme court prefers the rough and tumble of practical politics to the cloister of the bench. Latest evidence comes from Mrs. Van Dusen, Detroit, democratic national committeewoman, who reports that Justice Murphy desired nomination for vice-president.

More camps for German war prisoners are being established this summer in Michigan. Escape of several Nazis is giving the army a problem.

Detroit, the world's automobile town, is the oldest city west of the original seaboard colonies, having celebrated its 137th birthday before Chicago received its first charter. . . . The 176 posts of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Michigan are co-operating closely with the newly-created State Office of Veteran Affairs at Lansing. Arthur W. Thomas is the state adjutant with offices in Detroit.

Newspaper publishers will honor the memory of the late W. Frank Knox, war-time secretary of the navy, at a dinner Friday, Aug. 4, at Sault Ste. Marie. Knox's newspaper associate at the Soo, where he owned the Evening News, was Frank Sparks, editor of the Grand Rapids Herald, who will give the address Aug. 4. Knox served as president of the Michigan Press association in 1904.

One-Celled Plants
The yeasts are predominantly one-celled plants which reproduce rapidly and in their growth form alcohol and carbon dioxide from the sugary materials on which they feed. The precise nature of the products depends on the kind of yeast and the nutrient used; originally the "wild" yeasts floating in the air did man's fermentations, but today carefully cultured strains are used, adapted to the particular application and protected from contamination. Traditionally the two great fields for yeast are the production of alcoholic products and the leavening of bread, where carbon dioxide bubbles from the yeast give a fluffy structure.

G. I. Board
To maintain the average soldier in continental United States during his first year of service, the quartermaster corps spends \$215.35 for his food, \$173.70 for his clothing, \$44.70 for his individual equipment and \$31.31 for his barracks equipment, a total of \$465.06. The cost of feeding a soldier is now 69 cents a day, three cents a day less than a year ago.

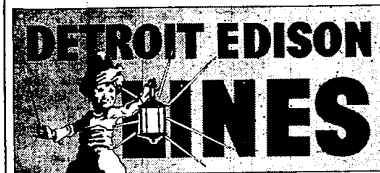
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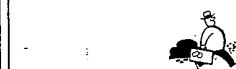
