

Air Shoes
Shoes should be aired after each wearing to dry perspiration, preventing odor and injury to the leather. Clean them occasionally on the inside by washing with damp cloth and soap, using the water sparingly and wiping with a dry cloth to remove excess moisture. Don't wear shoes over bare feet—wear stockings or foot protectors. When not worn, shoes may be kept in shape by using shoe trees or stuffing them with wads of paper.

Chilled Jars
Jars should not be subjected to sudden chill. Sterilization should be dispensed completely before lifting canner cover, and then raise the jar of the cover first. Hot jars should be placed out of cold drafts on a wood or linoleum surface. Avoid further handling, except to tighten caps, until jars are cool.
