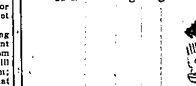

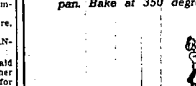
INFORMATION, PLEASE... The electric business is extremely technical. Knotty problems are continually popping up. When one of our engineers encounters a 564 question that he can't answer, he usually fires it at the Research Department. The variety of subjects investigated is startling. For example: "What will be the trend of the water level of the Detroit River in the near future?" Water level has an important bearing on the design of power plants. And almost equally vital: "In the oven of an electric range, how strong should the racks be to support the weight of a Thanksgiving turkey without sagging?"



CHINESE RECIPE... Perhaps this recipe is no more Chinese than chop suey, but our Home Service Department recommends it highly:

Chinese Omelet
1/2 cup uncooked rice 3 eggs, separated
4 tsp. butter 1/4 tsp. paprika
4 tsp. all-purpose enriched 1/4 tsp. salt
flour 1/2 tsp. dry mustard
2 cups milk 4 tsp. grated cheese

Cook rice till tender. Rinse with hot and cold water. Make sauce of butter, flour and milk. Cook until thickened. Beat egg yolks. Add rice, sauce, seasonings and cheese. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into greased shallow pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Serves six.
