Assessment Is Higher

FARMINGTON

Because of recent inaccurate publicity on results of last year's state assessment tests given fourth and seventh graders, the Farmington Board of Education has promised to provide a public analysis of the results at a future board meeting.

The Farmington Enterprise and Observer published a report of Farmington's status in its Nov. 20 issue, just after the results were known, and an area-wide analysis in its Dec. 1 issue.

A week ago, however, the Detroit News and Free Press covered a statewide report issued by Dr. John Porter, state superintendent of public instruction. The Free Press quoted Farmington's figures inaccurately. Joseph Nicita, director of secondary education, told the board. He said the paper promised to run a corrected account.

Bussing Rally Slated Tuesday

An anti-bussing meeting has been set for 7:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 21, in the cafeteria of Farmington Senior High on Shawwassee between Power and Orchard Lake Rds.

The meeting is being sponsored by Tri-County Citizens for Intervention in Federal School Action No. 3527. Local Tri-County Citizens coordinator is Mrs. Mary Ann Rossman of Oakland, Farmington.

Tri-County Citizens has grown since formation to a membership of about 20,000 residents from Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties.

On Tuesday, Feb. 22, Federal Judge Stephen Roth is expected to rule whether Tri-County Citizens will be allowed to intervene in the desegregation lawsuit.

TRI-COUNTY incorporated Oct. 26, 1971, to challenge the authority of the court to demand a metropolitan plan without suburban involvement.

"This would be like a trial without a defendant," says Mrs. Hossman.

The group retained Robert Lord of Warren to represent them and on Dec. 2 Lord filed the formal request for intervention.
