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


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Three on a Match
One theory of the origin of the
superstition "three on a match" is
linked with World War I where it
was said that the military danger of
keeping a match lit for a long time
in the trenches led to a superstition
against lighting three cigarettes

from one match. Some authorities
claim, however, that the supersti-
tion had its roots in the early fu-
neral service of the Eastern Catho-
lic church, during which three altar
candles were lighted with a single
paper. It was considered impious
to make other lights in this manner.


Peanut Butter Pie

1/2 cup peanut butter	1/2 cup sugar
1 cup boiling water	4 tablespoons flour
1 cup hot milk	3 egg yolks
	1/2 teaspoon salt

Mix the peanut butter with boiling water until smooth.
Thoroughly mix sugar, flour, egg yolks and salt. To this add
the hot milk. Combine with peanut butter mixture and cook
on "low" heat until thickened. Cool and pour into baked
pastry shell. Cover with meringue made with the egg whites.
Bake for 30 minutes in a 325° F. oven.
