The school board voi-ed to accept the company's bid of \$57,685, including all construction, electrical work, plumbing and fur-nishings. This figure is approxi-mately \$3,000 less than it had been

mately \$3,000 less tann it mad been anticipated.

Bids ranged 31 the way from the Atkin-Fordon figure to nearly \$70,000. Including architectural fees, advertising and interest, tile cost of the addition will total \$61, 102.48, which sum will be paid out of the bond issue of \$32,000, and the Federal grain of \$32,000.

The new addition will greatly relieve the crowded condition in the Clarenceville Schools and help to more adequately care for increased enrollment.
