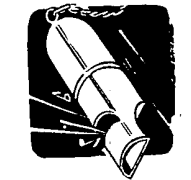


CLEAN AS A WHISTLE... were the streets of Farmington Tuesday after the city employees obligingly removed the accumulation of ice and snow.
