friends he returned Saturday, January 13, to North Camp Hood, Texas.
Staff Sergeant Gordon R. Breeding, waist gunner on the B-17 Flying Fortress, "The Dugan Wagon," has completed the seventh month of a distinguished combat career. He has taken part in more than 25 Eighth Air Force bombing attacks on German industrial targets and military strongpoints in the path of advancing Allied armies in Western Europe.

The Air Medal and three oak leaf clusters, conferred for "meritorious achievement while participating in the air offensive against the enemy over continental Europe" testify to the sergeant's heroic and gallant record.
Part in aerial assaults on a variety of objectives, ranging from enemy

airfields and aircraft plants to oil refineries and front line positions. He has participated in attacks on targets at Hanover, Glessen, Berlin, Ludwigshafen, Cologne, Merseburg and Kiel.
Sgt. Breeding is a member of the 34th Bombardment Group, a unit of the Third Bombardment Division, the division cited by the President for its now historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt plants at Regensburg, Germany.
The sergeant is the son of Mrs. John P. Mackay, 31835 14-Mile Rd., Farmington. His wife, Nellie Breeding, also lives at Farmington. A repairman, the gunner was employed in Farmington before entering the AAF. He is graduate of Farmington High School.

First Lieutenant Marshall J. McKelvey, 23, of Farmington, has arrived at Army Air Forces Redistribution Station No. 2 in Miami Beach for reassignment processing after completing a tour of duty outside the continental United States. Lieutenant McKelvey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Park H. McKelvey, 20424 Fremont, was a B-24 bombardier. He flew 32 missions over Europe, and won the DFC, and the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters.
He resides at 5737 Missouri Street, Detroit. Lt. McKelvey attended Farmington High School, and entered the Army in July, 1942.

T/Sgt. Norman W. Greger, 20, of 32299 Oakland Street, has arrived at the Air Force Redistribution Station in Miami Beach, Florida, for reassignment, where he will remain for about two weeks. He flew 33 missions as a B-17 radio operator and gunner during six months in the European theater and won the DFC and the Air Medal with three clusters.
He worked as a tool and die apprentice at the Ford Motor Company's Highland Park plant before joining the AAF March 15, 1943. His mother, Mrs. William Greger, lives at the same address, while his wife lives at 15335 Pierson Street, Detroit.

Private James S. Rowland, 30255 14-Mile Road, engineer combat soldier, is a member of the 313th Combat Engineer Battalion, which has been ordered to fight in the mud and mountains from Cassino and the Garigliano River to the Po Valley since joining the Fifth Army in Italy early in 1944. The men of the 313th have won two Legions of Merit, seven Silver Stars, three Bronze Stars and three Medals and three division commendations. The battalion also was honored by the city of Muskogee, Oklahoma, for distinguished work during the Arkansas River floods of May, 1943.

Winifred Kaufmann, 1 1/2, United States Coast Guard Reserve, is now stationed in San Francisco, California, having just been transferred from New Orleans, Louisiana.

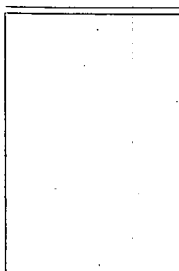
