dially invited.



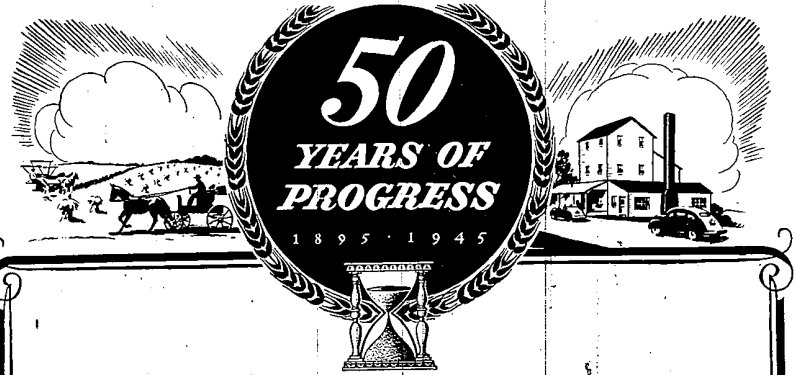
